The Cook's Nook

Authors Sang of Pudding but We

Prove Its Worth on Winter Menus

Pudding rates as high with winter appetites as it did with the authors of old, which is very high indeed! A perusal of the "Familiar Quotations" of the indefatigable Bartlett reveals that this delectable product of the cook's most skillful art was the theme of such famous men as Pope (who claimed a solid pudding is better than empty pressel), of Gilbert who deemed that "Life is a pudding full of plums," and of Cervantes who gave us the most-quoted one of them all: "The proof of the pudding is in the eating!"

An ancient proverb gives us the rule for puddings—"Cold pudding settles one's love" and for appetite, there is the immortal description of the Cratchit's pudding in "A Christmas Carol!"

For recipes there are many, and especially delicious are these. May you all be 'puddin' heads!"

Date Graham Pudding

1 1/2 cups graham flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. soda
1 tsp. baking powder
2 cups dates, sliced
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 cup milk
1 egg

Mix the dry ingredients without sifting. Mix the dates through the flour with the finger tips. Melt the butter; add the molasses, milk and beaten egg; stir this mixture into the dry ingredients. Fill well-greased molds two-thirds full of the batter. Cover tightly. Steam for 2 1/2 to 3 hours. Serve with hard sauce or a liquid pudding sauce. 8 to 10 servings.

Butterscotch Rice Pudding

1/3 cup rice
1 1/2 cup cold water
5 cups milk
2 tbsps. butter
1 cup brown sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tbsps. plain gelatine

Wash rice and cook until nearly tender in a double boiler with two cups scalded milk and salt. Meanwhile cook together in a shallow pan brown sugar and butter until it becomes very dark brown but not burnt. Add this to the rice and milk and stir until dissolved. Add gelatin to hot rice mixture and turn into mold that has been rinsed in cold water and chill. When firm, unmold and serve plain or with whipped cream or a fruit sauce. 8

servings.

Plum Pudding

1 lb. flour
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. soda
2 tbsps. baking powder
2 tbsps. cinnamon
2 tbsps. cloves
2 tbsps. mace
1 lb. grated carrots
1 cup melted butter
1 1/2 lbs. raisins
1 1/2 lbs. currants
2 eggs
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 cup dark corn syrup
Mix and sift dry ingredients. Add carrots. Add melted butter and mix well. Add rest of ingredients and blend thoroughly. Fill 1 large or 4 small oiled molds two-thirds full. Cover tightly with oiled paper and steam 5 hours. Serves 5.

Children's "Plum" Pudding

A pudding that looks just like a plum pudding, but is skillfully disguised for the youngsters is made this way: Soak 2 cups stale bread crumbs, grated, in 4 cups of scalded milk until soft. Melt a square of unsweetened chocolate in a small pan set over hot water or in a double boiler. Pour over the chocolate enough of the hot milk strained from the soaked bread to thin the chocolate until it pours easily. Then add this to the warm bread and milk and add 1 cup white corn syrup, 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon almond extract; then add 2 eggs, slightly beaten and last 1 cup finely chopped dates, and 1 cup finely chopped nutmeats. Stir briskly and lightly and turn into greased baking dish or mold. Bake for 1 hour. Turn mold out on lace paper doily, put sprig of holly on top and pass whipped cream.

Steamed Date Pudding

2 1/2 cups flour
4 tbsps. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup dates
1/2 cup butter
1 cup brown sugar
1 egg
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1 cup milk

Sift the dry ingredients together; add the finely cut dates. Cream the butter; add the sugar gradually, then the well-beaten egg and the vanilla. Add the fruit and flour mixture alternately with the milk. Pour the batter in to well-greased molds. Steam two hours.

Modern Woman Takes Her Cue



A SMILING, confident old lady sat in the front row of an indoor stadium at the Chicago World's Fair last month, urging her daughter on to a world's championship.

Behind her in the rising tiers of seats were six hundred other spectators. They had come to watch a game of billiards, but the old lady could not see the play, for she was blind. Her daughter did not win. She lost by one point and another girl is the champion today.

The old lady's presence in the front row was only one incident of a colorful event which brought together some of the best billiard players in the country—and all of them were women.

Only recently has billiards come out of the pool room, back from the wrong side of the railroad tracks. Only recently have women rediscovered that here is a game two sexes can play at, and that a cigar is not essential equipment for a game of billiards.

Learning billiards is easier than learning to knit. You've got to watch a knitter before you can learn to knit. The instructions would run something like this:

Hold the needle in this

hand, and this needle in this hand, and this is how you throw the thread, and you hold the yarn like this.

Could anything be more confusing?

Yet the very foundation of good billiards can be put down here. No billiard table is needed to learn the basic fundamental of the "billiards hand." Try it:

First, form a circle with the thumb and forefinger of the left hand by placing the tips of the two fingers together.

Then move the middle finger downward as far as possible toward the palm of the hand.

Next, slide the tip of an imaginary cue through this circle, having it pass over the top of the middle finger, touching it at, or a little above, the middle joint.

Now tighten the circle about the cue until both fingers and thumb touch the cue on all sides.

Now place the hand on the table, fingers well spread and the heel of the hand on the table, using just enough pressure to make the "bridge" firm.

Make any adjustment you please for the sake of comfort. You are ready to play.

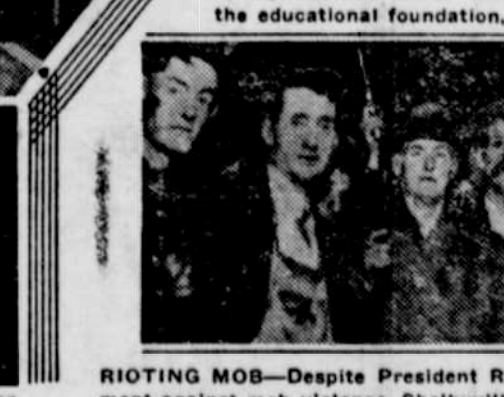
