COLLECTIVE BARGAINING IN THE STEEL INDUSTRY

EDITOR'S NOTE: Recent strike threats by union leaders in the steel industry have received a great deal of public attention recently. It has been alleged that the steel employers have refused to bargain collectively with their employees but this is categorically denied by the operators. The following article is the fourth of a series prepared by the American Iron and Steel Institute to explain the steel industry's position on this vital question.

PART IV. THE CLOSED SHOP

The employee representation plan provides for day to day action. Issues which arise may be discussed and settled immediately over the table by conference between employees' representatives and management, and thus disposed of before they have a chance to rankle in the minds of men.

Furthermore, under the employee representation plan, local matters pertaining to each plant may be taken up and settled in the manner most satisfactory and expedient for that particular plant.

The unions are not inclined to make allowance for variations in conditions between different plants, or between different cities. If an unfair condition occurs in one plant, the workers in twenty other plants may be called out on strike regardless of the fact that the workers in these twenty plants are being treated with all fairness.

This brings strife and discord into a large number of plants where it has not existed before—causes unemployment, suffering and discontent—all because of a situation which may perhaps have arisen in one single comparatively unimportant mill.

The part jurisdictional disputes have played in the history of the American

Federation of Labor has done much to discredit national unionism in the minds of the public as well as employers.

Under the employee representation plan, not only are employees represented by men whom they elect, but any employee has the right to raise his individual case at any time.

Under "union labor," an individual employee is prevented from taking his case before his employer. He has no rights as an individual.

He is not even allowed to make his own bargain with his employer as an individual, if he prefers to do so.

Under the employee representation plan, an employee may belong to the plan or not, as he chooses. He may, if he prefers, belong to a "labor union."

Under "union labor," no such free choice is permitted. The union demands a closed shop. A man must belong to the union or lose his job. If he is dropped from the union for any reason, such as non-payment of dues, he not only is forced to leave his job, but is prevented from securing any other job in a union shop.

This is a denial of the fundamental right of contract.

CANNERS TO GO TO O.S.C. FOR COURSE

The fourteenth annual canners school, originated and conducted by the horticultural products section at Oregon State college, has been scheduled for February 4-16. It is open to both experienced or beginning canners who may attend all or any part of the 2-weeks course.

Fundamental instruction of particular interest to those new to the industry or those undertaking the operation of community canning plants, will be included throughout the first week. It deals mostly with fruit and vegetable canning principles and specific practices.

In the second week new problems including latest developments in pea, corn and tomato canning work will be emphasized. Discussions of marketing codes, ripening problems, federal and state inspection service, bacterial spoilage, and many other technical problems will be held.

As usual a double seaming course, in which training may be had in handling the standard and most modern canning machinery, will be given throughout the entire two weeks. No charge is made for the course other than a registration fee of \$1.
