KNEE ACTION INTEGRAL PART OF CAR

Amplifying his statements when he announced prices of the two new Chevrolet lines for 1935, W. E. Holler, General Sales Manager of the Chevrolet Motor Company, stated that enclosed knee action, optional on the Master deluxe models, will be available at an additional charge of \$20.00 list. Mr. Holler predicted that at least 90 per cent of persons buying Mas-

ter models in 1935 would exercise the option and obtain knee action at the small price difference involved.

Mr. Holler emphasized the fact that knee action will be built in at the factory and not installed by the dealers. "Chevrolet's knee action mechanism," he said, "is an integral part of the car. It cannot be installed as an accessory. There will be no conversions in the field. Cars will be available, both with and without knee action, but they will be built complete at the factory where special machinery, skilled workers, and other factors, all focus on the production of this major feature which is offered only by Chevrolet and builders of higher priced cars."
