COLLECTIVE BARGAINING IN THE STEEL INDUSTRY

EDITOR'S NOTE: Recent strike threats by union leaders in the steel industry have received a great deal of public attention recently. It has been alleged that the steel employers have refused to bargain collectively with their employees but this is categorically denied by the operators. The following article is the sixth of a series prepared by the American Iron and Steel Institute to explain the steel industry's position on this vital question.

PART VI STEEL INDUSTRY'S POSITION SUMMARIZED

The foregoing explains succinctly the underlying reasons for the stand which the steel industry has taken with respect to labor since the inauguration of NRA.

The steel industry had not opposed the principle of collective bargaining. It has opposed the practices of national labor unions.

It has favored employee representation as a fairer and more efficient form of collective bargaining.

In so doing, the industry believes that it is acting in accordance with the spirit and the letter of the National Industrial Recovery Act as laid down in Section 7-A as follows:

1. That employees shall have the right to organize and bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing, and shall be free from the interference, restraint, or coercion of employers of labor, or their agents, in the designation of such representatives or in self-organization or in other concerted activities for the purpose of collective bargaining or other mutual aid or protection;

2. That no employee and no one seeking employment shall be required as a condition of employment to join any or any union or to refrain from joining, organizing, or assisting a labor organization, of his own choosing; and
