The Cook's Nook

Eat It With Relish—And You Will!

Do you relish your food in both meanings of the word? That is, to explain this week attempt at word-play, do you eat with gusto or "relish" and also serve yourself some of these appetizing tidbits known as "relishes"? If you have abandoned the custom, seek in your china-closet, resurrect that relish dish and "compote" and begin all over again!

Relishes are numerous as galoshes in slush, and much more exciting. More than one sketchy and uninteresting meal has been transformed into what the roadside stands call a "tasty bite" by the addition of a bright and piquant relish (remember those spiced peaches, those pickled peppers?). Tart and spicy relishes are usually most popular, but the sweet ones are delicious with meat and fowl. The only rule is that the relish be in direct contrast to the food it accompanies, in flavor, color and texture.

Lucky is the homemaker who has a shelf of homemade picallili, chow chow and preserve—but luckier yet is she who will take a minute to mix up some of the freshly made variety, such as these given below.

Old-fashioned Cole-Slaw

(For the fish dinner)

1 green pepper (chopped)
1 ts. salt
2 tbsps. vinegar
Dash of pepper
Few drops onion juice
4 cups cabbage
1 tbsps. sugar
Dressing

Shred cabbage finely, add chopped pepper, and onion juice. Salt, sugar and pepper should be sprinkled on, then moisten with cooking dressing, according to taste. Mix well and serve cold in individual dishes. To make dressing: Mix 3 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1½ tablespoons prepared mustard, 1½ tablespoons flour, 1 egg, ¾ cup of milk and 2½ tablespoons vinegar. Cook ingredients, which have been mixed in order given over hot water, stirring constantly, until thick. Add 1 tablespoon salad oil and blend thoroughly. Cool.

Pickled beets (try adding hard boiled eggs to the beet pickles) are another favorite. Crisp cucumber slices or strips, pickled in French dressing are old timers, and olives, radishes, pickled onions, and olives, radishes, pickled onions, tomatoes and pickles are on everybody's list. Crystallized ginger (ever try it in tea?), salted nuts, and stuffed dates are dessert relishes, and sauce of cranberries or apples are relish and dessert in one. But try these!

Apricot-Date Conserve

(A Sweet Relish for Fowl)
1 cup dried apricots
1 pkg. dates
4 cups cold water
1 cup sugar
Juice of one lemon
¼ cup chopped walnuts

Wash the apricots, cover with two cups of cold water, let soak overnight. Add the pitted dates and two cups of water. Cook until the fruit is very soft. Add sugar and lemon juice, and simmer over low heat to the consistency of jam. Add chopped nuts and cook for 5 minutes. Store in sterilized jelly glasses. Cover with hot paraffin when cold. Fills 2 half pint jars.

Molded Garnish of Rice

(Excellent with Cold Meat Platter)

2 cups cold, cooked rice
1 tablespoon gelatin
¼ cup cold water
2 cups boiling water
1 tablespoon vinegar
1 tablespoon green pepper
½ cup ripe olives
¼ cup cucumber pickles
¼ cup celery
¼ cup cottage cheese
1 teaspoon salt
¼ cup cucumber

Soak the gelatin in cold water. Dissolve in the boiling water. Cool. Be sure pickles, olives and cucumber are finely chopped. When this begins to set, fold in the other ingredients. Pour into the mold. Chill, until set. Serve on lettuce with tart salad dressing as cold meat accompaniment. 7 servings.

Vegetable Relish

(Relish and Salad Combined)

Cut celery, which has been washed and crisped, into thin match-like strips; cut raw carrots into similar strips and marinate both in Roquefort Cheese dressing and serve cold in individual relish dishes to accompany either fish or meat dish. To make Dressing: Blend 1/3 cup salad oil, 1½ tablespoons vinegar, ¼ teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon paprika and ¼ teaspoon sugar. Place in a stoppered bottle and chill thoroughly. Before serving shake vigorously until oil and vinegar blend to form thick emulsion. When ready to pour over celery and carrots, add 1 ounce mashed or crumbled Roquefort cheese to the mixture.
