NEW PROJECT SEEKS FACTS ON PASTURES

With pasture constituting 69 per cent of the total acreage of Oregon farms, according to the 1930 census, more information is needed to determine the relative costs and returns from different kinds of pasture in different parts of the state, and more efficient methods of producing this kind of livestock feed, believes the farm management department of the Oregon Experiment station.

Accordingly federal approval has been received for conducting a comprehensive pasture cost study, to be financed with Purnell research funds. The study is to continue over three years, during which actual data will be gathered from between 500 and 1000 pasture enterprises scattered throughout the state of Oregon.

From the studies it is hoped to determine for the different kinds of pasture their relative productivity under varying conditions, the cost of the feed produced and the factors affecting it, means of reducing this cost, and the cost of establishing pastures.

The Oregon dairy cost study conducted in a similar manner a few years ago showed that from a third to one-half of the feed of dairy cows is obtained from pasture. It is presumed that pasture is an even more important factor in other livestock enterprises, says H. E. Selby, farm management specialist, who will head the new project. He will be assisted by A. S. Burrier, E. R. Jackson, and O. M. Nelson of the experiment station staff.

U. S. CIVIL SERVICE ISSUES WARNING

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations for the following positions:

Engineering draftsman (highway) \$1800 a year, Bureau of Public Roads.

Junior medical officer (interne), St. Elizabeths Hospital, Washington, D. C.

Associate supervisor of elementary education, \$3,200 a year, Indian Field Service.

The closing date for receipt of applications for these examinations is February 18, 1935.

The salaries named are subject to a deduction of not to exceed 5 percent during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935, as a measure of economy, and also to a deduction of 3 1/2 percent toward a retirement annuity.

Oregon has received less than its quota of appointments in the apportioned departmental service in Washington, D. C. Of the positions named, only engineering draftsman is affected by the State apportionment law.

Full information may be obtained from the Secretary of the United States Civil Service Board of Examiners at the post office or customhouse in any city which has a post office of the first or the second class, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.
