Grilled Tomatoes with Sliced Brazil Nuts

Select tomatoes of even size and cut in halves. Sprinkle each half with salt, pepper and paprika, dot with butter or minced bacon. Set under broiler flame and cook 3 minutes; then sprinkle thickly with sliced Brazil nuts and continue broiling until nuts are browned.

Cherry Pie Glacé

1 1/2 cups (1 can) red cherries, drained
1/2 cup sugar
1 package cherry-flavored gelatin
1/2 cups warm cherry juice and water
1 teaspoon salt
1 baked 9-inch pie shell
Combine cherries and sugar. Dissolve gelatin in warm cherry juice and water. Add salt and pour over cherries. Chill. When slightly thickened, turn into cold pie shell. Chill until firm.

Pineapple Juice Mousse Cup

1 cup Hawaiian pineapple juice
1 cup pastry cream
1 tablespoon gelatin
1 small glass dish

When At Eve It's "Stag"—Let The Men Cook their Own Good Food

All is not steak and pie on the masculine horizon. Men like salads, men like pudding, men like gingerbread, fudge, cake, casserole dishes, too, and believe it or not, can cook them with ease and skill! That, at least, is the result of a one-woman survey recently conducted. Further, it is not only the chef of France, or the proprietor of the wayside diner who can cook, but the garden-variety, orange-juice-squeezer type of male who can cook—if he wants to!

Scrambled eggs, scorched toast and coffee are often all a husband confesses to master, a questnaire answered by 53 men indicates, but actually turn him loose with an incentive and the ingredients and the wary male will surprise his friends, his wife, and even himself!

"They laughed when he stood up to cook"—but watch the results when a man who likes to eat decides he also likes to cook. "Occasionally" to be frank, was the answer given by 22 asked when they

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2 thick slices of salt pork, finely diced
3 cups hot water
Salt, pepper
2 medium sized onions, cut fine
2 cups tomato juice and pulp
4 tbsps. minced parsley
Paprika
Fry the salt pork until it is slightly browned. Then add the rice which has been washed and drained, and stir until the rice is a golden brown, adding the onion meantime. Add the hot water gradually, cover and cook until the rice is tender, then add the remaining ingredients. Place the mixture in greased baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (300° F.) for about 1/2 hour, 6 servings.

Chiffonade Salad

1 head lettuce
1 can grapefruit
3 small tomatoes
Horseradish Dressing
2 green peppers
Line a salad bowl with lettuce. In this nest of lettuce leaves arrange the shredded green peppers, tomatoes cut in quarters, and the canned grapefruit. Serve with Horseradish Dressing made this way: Mix 2 tablespoons grapefruit juice, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1/4 cup salad oil, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Beat thoroughly. Add 1 tablespoon horseradish and pour dressing over salad. 5 to 6 servings.

Benedict Pudding

1/4 cup dry bread crumbs
1 cup dates
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking powder
1 tbsps. melted butter
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup nut meats
Mix the bread (or cracker) crumbs, sliced dates, sugar, chopped nuts, salt and baking powder, together. Add the melted butter, vanilla and milk. Pour into a buttered baking dish. Place in a pan of hot water and bake thirty minutes in a moderate oven (375° F.). Serve with whipped cream. 6 to 8 servings.

C and C Canape

Cut a mold of canned cranberry sauce into quarter-inch slices. Cut thin slices of day-old bread into rounds with a three inch cutter (or top of baking powder can). Spread the bread with softened cream cheese. Place a disc of cranberry sauce on each round and pile cream cheese around the edges, with a fork. Serve as an appetizer.

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DEAN OF FORESTRY SCHOOL IS HONORED

Completion of 25 years of continuous service as dean of the school of forestry at Oregon State college, by George W. Peavy, now president of the entire institution, was celebrated at Corvallis at the annual Fernhoppers' banquet attended by more than 500 federal and state forestry officials, alumni and students and other friends.

The group surprised the dean, as he is still known to many, with one of the most unusual silver anniversary gifts on record. Represented by Lynn Cronemiller, his friends and former students presented him with a "log cabin in the hills" to be built on any site approved by President Peavy, and to which he may retreat to "hold in" when he needs to get away from the press of his present executive duties.

The plan is to build a real old-time foresters log cabin in some cut-of-the-way spot, and equip it with fireplace, cookstove and bunks, combining comfort with authentic rustic reproductions.

President Peavy was the principal speaker at the banquet and reviewed the progress of forestry in the 30 years with which he has been actively connected with the profession. The five most significant achievements he listed as follows:

1. Creation of immense forest reserves.
2. Routing of "timber predators", even at the cost of some tarnished names.
3. Creation of a national forest consciousness which insures against any serious backward steps.
4. Carrying out of a vast forest improvement program as a by-product of depression relief through the CCC camps, which will turn millions of recreation seekers to the forests and make them supporters of forestry.
5. Adoption of sustained yield management by commercial timber owners, as well as by the federal government on the reserves.

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
