SELECTION AND CARE OF CALF DISCUSSED

The first consideration in selecting a heifer calf for club work should be the production record and general type of the entire herd from which the calf comes, remarked R. W. Morse, extension dairy man, in a discussion of the selection and care of the dairy calf at a 4-H meeting held at the Connell Bros. farm, Saturday, April 6th, according to L. E. Francis, Assistant County Agent. Thirty dairy club members were present. Mr. Morse further remarked that it is important to consider the sire and dam of the calves as well as the records of its sisters and half sisters. The calf itself should conform to the breed type, have a vigorous constitution, and good capacity.

In his discussion of calf feeding, he pointed out the importance of keeping calves on fresh milk as long as possible. However, where fresh milk is not available, a calf can be raised very successfully on a well balanced ration using dry skim milk. In order to secure proper and maximum growth it is essential that the calf be kept under sanitary conditions and be fed a carefully analyzed and well balanced calf meal. Exercise and sunshine are always important.

The Cook's Nook

Housewives Head for "Round Up"

Round up flavor, round up appetite, and round out the menu—by serving it in a ring! Perhaps women would rather be roundabout than direct, or perhaps the even, round symmetry is pleasant to the eye, but it's a fact that there's something tempting about food served in a circle! Of course plates are round (unless you produce ultra-modern square ones, to disprove this story) and thus food in a ring arranges itself prettily upon the dish.

Ring molds are very much in vogue now, and are often not only an appearance-factor, but the answer to the left-over problem. Rings of snowy rice are gracing the best tables—with all manner of delicious things inside them, from fruit to meat or vegetables. Economical, too, these fair white beauties—for you may cream those leftovers, or combine those "dabs" of fruit and serve them in a ring of rice that extends flavor and amount.

Other foods in rings, or in round shapes are equally fascinating and delicious—a circular salad, a delicate molded dessert, a cake, a pie, or even cookies. Tests show that sandwiches are more interesting cut in rounds and even the popular banana seems to taste better when it's sliced in golden rounds than when it's cubed or squared.

Figure out the psychology of "roundness" for yourself, but let these recipes guide you when you head for your own round-up:

Rice Ring Mold

2 cups cooked rice
1/2 tsp. salt
2 cups milk
2 tbsps. butter
1/4 cup sugar
2 tbsps. cornstarch
1/2 cup cold milk
3 egg whites

Mix cornstarch and cold milk. Heat rice, milk, sugar, salt in double boiler. Add the cornstarch mixed with cold milk, and cook fifteen minutes. Fold in beaten egg whites. Turn into a ring mold. Chill. Unmold onto a large platter. Or, if you prefer, simply boil your rice (allowing 1 cup of raw rice to 2 quarts boiling water and 3 tea-spoons salt) until tender, then allow it to dry out and "fluff". Then simply arrange it in an even ring on plate with a spoon.

Suggestions for Rice Rings

(1) Fill rice ring with any favorite combination of creamed asparagus and garnish with radish roses, sweet pickles or lemon slices.

(2) Pour creamed chicken into center of rice ring and garnish with sautéed mushrooms. (3) Fill center of rice rings with buttered chicken or crabmeat, creamed salmon or shrimp creole and place extra servings around outside of ring to form a border. (4) Combine sliced canned peaches, red cherries and orange slices. Put in middle of ring, and serve with a sweet sauce and whipped cream, if desired.

Banana Rounds

6 slices canned pineapple
2 ripe bananas
2 cups grapes
1/2 cup mayonnaise
Lettuce

Arrange slices of pineapple on lettuce leaves. Slice the bananas, and cover with lemon juice. Let stand 5 minutes and drain. Arrange a circle of banana slices around outside edge of each piece of pineapple. Pile some of the grapes (halved and seeded) in center of each pineapple slice. Garnish with remainder of grapes and mayonnaise.

Date Circles

2 pkgs. cream cheese
30 dates
30 pecan meats
1 1/2 to 2 tbsps. cream or fruit juice
1/2 cup French dressing

Pit dates and stuff with cream cheese which has been moistened to a cream with cream or fruit juice. Press a halved pecan meat on each date. Arrange the dates in a circle on a bed of lettuce leaves, placing the dressing in the center. 6 servings. If you like, arrange the dates on a round of pineapple, and place a stuffed date in the middle. Or alternate cooked grapefruit segments and date strips on the pineapple slice.

Nut Roundies

1 cup brown sugar
1 tsp. ginger
1 tsp. salt
2 cups dark corn syrup
3/4 cup shortening
4 cups pastry flour
2 tbsps. baking powder
1 cup seeded raisins
1/4 tsp. soda

Put sugar, syrup, ginger, melted shortening and salt into saucepan together. Stir mixture until it boils; then boil five minutes. Pour into bowl and stir in flour, soda and baking powder sifted together, until stiff enough to drop from a spoon. Add raisins and drop by spoonful on to oiled baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 8 to 10 minutes.

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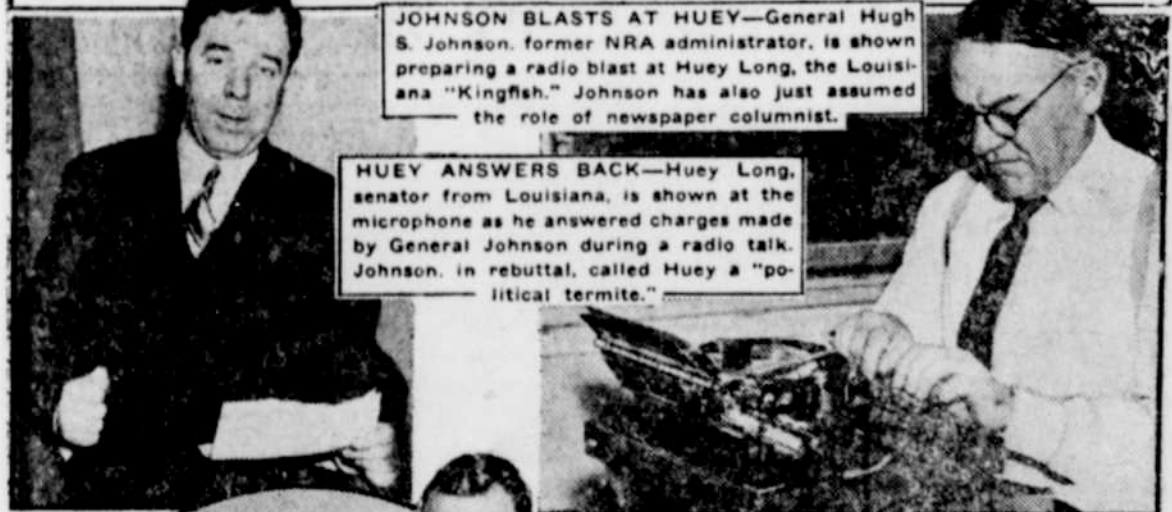

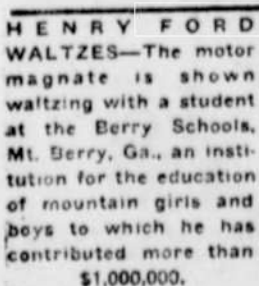
