EXPLANATION MADE OF NEW REGULATIONS

Permission to exceed the total wheat acreage allowed by the contracts for 1935 by permitting more spring wheat to be planted does not materially effect the Washington County wheat contract signer. Due to weather conditions last fall many wheat contract signers did not get their minimum acreage seeded. This only means that where the total acreage for 1935 is less than this required minimum, signers will not receive the full 1935 benefit payment. To receive full payments farmers need to seed spring wheat to make up this deficiency if there is any. There is not any penalty other than loss of benefit payments for failure to plant the minimum acreage.

Granting the privilege of seeding wheat in excess of their mini-

mum depends upon the farmer signing an agreement to make a proportionate reduction in his 1936 crop if he should be called upon to do so. Instructions from the wheat administration in Washington very clearly indicates that it will still be necessary for the farmer to have the required amount of contracted acres and that the permitted use of these contracted acres will conform to those uses outlined last fall and a copy of which was mailed to every wheat contract signer in Washington County in October.

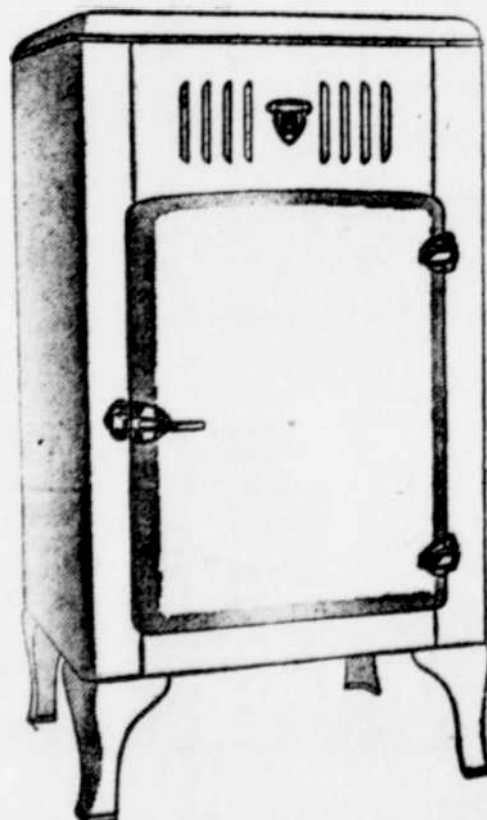
