The Cook's Nook

Mid-West Cookery Rises to Claim Rightful Place in Hall of Fame

The call to arms to all natives of the Middle West has sounded, and every son and daughter worthy of the name has risen in rightful wrath to demand a place in the gastronomic hall of fame! Southern cookery, Eastern and New England cookery, the joys of Western food have been touted far and wide, but few have come forth to proclaim the delights of the cooking that "grows" in the land of waving corn!

Middle Westerners, the reason is given, have been modest, have been silent. Middle Westerners, it is said, have served their foods so plain, so simply cooked, that they have become taken for granted, found too usual to become the subjects for song and story.

Yet the like of these has seldom been equalled: fried chicken—fresh young "barred rocks" or "reds" dismembered and cooked to a crisp glory in honest flour and grease; lettuce grown in single leaves and "wilting" with bacon and recondent vinegar; catfish, with boiled taters and butter; corn bread; corn meal mush; pickled peaches and pears with cinnamon stick and cloves clinging to their goodness; spare ribs that are neither corned nor palid, but baked to a crunchiness and served with "sauce" from the best apples in the orchard; date pudding, rich and golden; gingerbread; home-made picalilli; glorious and creamy banana pie!

These are but a few of the native dishes that are rife along the banks of the Illinois, Missouri, Mississippi rivers and farther inland, where the land is flat and mountains are unknown. Recipes for a few of the best are given here, each from an unassuming but "marvelous" cook!

Glorious Banana Pie

6 bananas
1 cup heavy cream, whipped
1 tsp. powdered sugar
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1 baked 9-inch pie shell or 6 tart shells

Slice bananas. Mix thoroughly whipped cream, powdered sugar, vanilla, and add bananas. Fill baked pie or tart shells with this mixture. Sprinkle with grated unsweetened chocolate if desired. Serves 6.

Marjorie's Date Pudding

1 1/2 tbsps. flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 cup nutmeats
1/2 cup milk

1 pkg. dates
1 cup dried bread crumbs
Mix flour, baking powder and sugar, together. Add dates (sliced), bread crumbs and chopped nutmeats. Stir in beaten eggs and milk. Pour into buttered baking dish. Place in pan of hot water and bake one hour in moderate oven (350° F.). Serve with whipped cream. 8-10 servings.

Irene's Good Cake Filling

1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup evaporated milk
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup nutmeats
1/2 cup raisins, chopped
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup dates
1 teaspoon vanilla
Place diluted milk and sugar in saucepan. Stir until the sugar is dissolved. Boil for about five minutes. Add the fruit, nuts and salt, and boil until the mixture will form a very soft ball in cold water. Cool, add vanilla, and beat until thick enough to spread between layers of cake. Sufficient filling for one three-layer cake.

Illinois Corn Bread

1 1/4 cups cornmeal
1/2 cup bread flour
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. soda
2 tbsps. baking powder
1 egg
2 tbsps. butter
3 tbsps. dark corn syrup
1 cup sour milk
Sift together all dry ingredients. Add egg, butter (melted), syrup and milk. Stir until thoroughly mixed. Bake in hot oven (400-425° F.) about 25 minutes.

Grandma's Rice Pudding

1/2 cup rice
1 qt. milk
1/2 tsp. cinnamon or nutmeg
4 tbsps. sugar (white or brown)
1/2 tsp. salt
Wash the rice thoroughly, add other ingredients and pour into a greased baking-dish. Bake for 3 hours in a slow oven (285° F.), stirring several times during the first hour. The mixture should not boil. Serve either hot or cold. The long, slow cooking gives the delicious flavor of the old-fashioned creamy pudding. One-half cup of raisins may be added if desired. 6

servings.

Pepper Hash

Put 1 cup seeded and chopped green peppers and 1 cup seeded and chopped red ones in bowl with 1 cup chopped onion. Mince finely and drain through colander. Put mixture in saucepan with 1/4 to 1/2 cup sugar, 2 teaspoons salt and 1 cup vinegar. Boil gently for 20 to 30 minutes. Store in glass jars. Makes about 4 cups of relish.
