High School Notes

Beaverton High trackmen added another victory to an impressive record last Friday by winning the Columbia-Washington County meet held at Hillsboro. Several star performers on the Beaverton team were absent, but in spite of this handicap sufficient points were garnered for first place.

The final standings were as follows: Beaverton, 48 1/6; St. Helens, 31 1/2; Scappoose, 30 2/3; Forest Grove, 27 1/3; Tigard, 16; Hillsboro, 1/3. The preliminaries were held in the morning, and the finals in the afternoon.

Frank Emmore was high point man of the meet with 18 1/2 points. He won first in the broad jump, second in the 100-yard dash, 220 yard dash, high jump; third in the shot; and ran anchor on the relay team to gain his points. Beaverton's fast relay team composed of Ellis Nylund, Rex Saxton, Don Jossey and Emmore ran away from the field to win by thirty yards.

Beaverton meets Roosevelt High of Portland in a dual meet this week.

Next Tuesday Beaverton will be host to Hillsboro, Forest Grove, and Tigard in the annual Washington County meet. The Beaverton squad has won the county championship six times in the past seven years, and is favored to win this year.

Lawyers for the prosecution were Joe Berter and Raymond Rugland.

The following jury was chosen after much questioning and consideration by the lawyers: John Staehle, Ed Jantzen, Lois Elery, Lyman Webb, and Marguerite Fer-

ris. Furious verbal battles waged between the lawyers, and at times the courtroom was in an uproar, but it didn't take long for our dignified judge, Mary Jane Junor, to settle it.

and as you—filled with the desire for "the better part". So through this column I would share with you some of the lovely things I find in books, in life, in the letters which come to me from far countries, and from near at hand, for a pleasure shared is a joy which is multiplied many times. Will you help me do this? Will you take a bit of time from your busy day and write to me? If you need a bit of comfort, a word of sympathy, ask that I may give; if you have a verse, a quotation which has helped you, send it to me that, through this column, I may pass it on to others, and thus we may, by the sharing of beauty, and of that which has given us joy, reach a higher appreciation of the treasures which lie about us.

To most of us the spring, in spite of its beauty, brings more work, because we do live close to the soil. Perhaps that is why I have chosen "the beauty of work" as my thought for you today. I would speak to you of the joy which lies in the labor of our hands. How few of us, as we go through the day's routine, think of work as being beautiful. Yet as Lil Gibran, a wonderful Syrian poet, speaks of work as "love made visible". Shall we carry that thought with us this week? Think of your tasks, your shining dishes, your clean floors, those long lines of windblown clothes swinging in the sunshine—shall we think of them as the visible manifestations of our love for children, husband, home? Love is always beautiful.

We are only beginning to understand that our thoughts really affect those about us, that the feelings we hold in our hearts as we labor with our hands bring about certain reactions in the final result, yet this same wise Syrian poet, of whom I spoke, knew this truth and wrote it down that all might read. He said: "Work is love made visible. And if you cannot work with love but only with distaste, it is better that you should leave your work and sit at the gate of the temple and take alms of those who work with joy."

"For if you bake bread with indifference, you bake a bitter bread that feeds but half man's hunger. And if you grudge the crushing of the grapes, your grudge distills a poison in the wine."

Wise words, dear bakers of bread. Shall we heed the truth they hold and bake our bread with love, and shall we look upon each part of our daily work as a thing of beauty, of usefulness, as holding a place of honor in the scheme of life? Remember no task can ever be menial if it is necessary.

Will you write to me, in care of this paper? Perhaps together we

may find greater beauty, opportunities for more perfect service, a deeper knowledge hidden in the daily routine of our lives.
