We speak of the need for peace between nations, we form peace clubs and listen to sermons on the joy of forgiveness, then we quarrel with our next-door neighbor over four feet of ground and hate our sister because she disagrees with us concerning the way to make bread.

We know, O Mary-Martas, that nothing appears to us as it really is, but only as we, ourselves, can realize it, and our realization, our comprehension, of any subject is formed and colored by our childhood training, our physical sight and reactions, our thoughts, the books we read, our associates, our environment. Since this is true, how then may we expect another, with a totally different sum total of experiences, to see any subject from exactly the same viewpoint as our own? Yet lives have been ruined, battles waged, homes torn asunder, because people could not understand that simple truth and make allowance for the differing comprehension.

So many people make a fetish of their intolerance, not realizing that such intolerance shows a narrowness of comprehension, an ignorance of different lines of thought, a lack of adequate response to another's intellectual vibration.

Do not be limited in your understanding, O you who think as you work, but strive to enlarge your range of comprehension to include that of different people, learn to look at any subject from more than just a personal angle—it can be done if you use your imagination to put yourself in another's place—and grant always to every one their right to their own viewpoint.

Did you ever realize that all our wars, our quarrels, our hatreds, come because of our efforts to make others do as we, ourselves, think best? We fight and struggle to make another conform to our standards, our conception of what is right and proper, but how often do we turn our gaze within and look at our own faults "face to face"? James Allen says:
"If thou wouldst right the world, And banish all its evils and its woes, Make its wild places bloom, And its drear deserts blossom as the rose,

THEN RIGHT THYSELF."
Do you remember the story of an old woman to whom someone gave a white narcissus? She was an untidy housekeeper and when she set the lovely flower in her window, the contrast between the dingy curtain and its beauty was pitiful, so she washed the window and the curtain. Their freshness led to other changes, until soon her entire house glowed with cleanliness. The effect is the same when we bring the flower of love and tolerance into our lives. Its white light shows up the dust and grime in our hearts and minds and as we clean the cobwebs of prejudice from one corner and the black ooze of hatred from another we soon begin to radiate friendliness and understanding, we grow in comprehension, our vision widens to embrace the viewpoints of others, and soon our "drear deserts blossom as the rose".

This is spring. The outpouring of life is flushing our fields with beauty. Shall we not begin anew—open our minds to understanding, to love; heal over old wounds of hatred with the fragrant blossoms of a new endeavor, go more than half way down the path that leads to reconciliation with our brother, our sister, our neighbor, and bring into our lives a realization that we are not separate isolated individuals fighting alone, sorrowing alone, but are each a part of life, separated from each other only through lack of understanding.

May the beauty of the spring bring each of us closer to a realization of our oneness with all of life.

The Cook's Nook

Only A "Trifle"—But a Grand Dish!
Trifles are important, if they are the kind we eat! According to a favorite proverb of Napoleon himself, "men are led by trifles" and warts called by that name makes no difference; Trifles are delicious!

A "Trifle" as nearly as can be determined from the scanty information obtainable on the subject, is of British origin and in some form or other, has always been a favorite "sweet" in England. Originally it referred to a dish of sponge cake soaked in wine and served with fruit sauce or cream. Later a Trifle became a delicious combination of custard pudding, combined with fruit. Nowadays a Trifle is usually a sort of combination of the two—a creamy custard combined with fruit and served on sponge cake, lady fingers, or cookies, with whipped cream.

Date-Ginger Trifle

1½ cups dates
2 cups cream
Candied ginger
Whipped cream

Place sliced dates and a few bits of candied ginger in a glass dish. Pour the cream over the dates. Chill for one hour. To serve, arrange a piece of sponge cake on an individual plate, cover with date and ginger mixture and garnish with whipped cream. Put a pitted date on top.

Banana Party "Trifle"

2 cups milk, scalded
2 eggs
¼ cup sugar
Few grains salt
½ tsp. vanilla
2-3 ripe bananas
Lady fingers
¼ cup cream, whipped
Beat egg slightly; beat in sugar and salt. Pour scalded milk over egg and sugar mixture. Return custard to top of the double boiler; stir over hot water until the mixture forms a coating on a metal spoon. Pour immediately into a bowl, add vanilla and cool. To serve, line a dessert dish with lady fingers, place a layer of sliced bananas in the bottom of the dish and cover with the chilled custard mixture. Top the whole with meringue, whipped cream or toasted marshmallows.

Rice Honey Custard

2/3 cup milk
1 egg yolk
1½ tbsps. honey
Few grains salt
1 cup uncooked rice
Macaroons to accompany
Scald milk in top of double boiler; pour over egg yolk mixed with honey and salt. Then return to double boiler, stir and cook until mixture thickens. Strain, and chill. Make a rice ring, pour custard in the center and serve with macaroons or cookies. To make rice ring: Cook 1 cup rice in 2 quarts of boiling water (to which 3 teaspoons salt have been added) until rice is tender. Turn into colander or sieve and "fluff" over hot water until each grain is distinct and separate. Arrange in ring with spoon (or put into ring mold) and chill.

Sponge Cake for Trifles

5 eggs whites
1 tbsps. lemon juice
1 tsp. vanilla
¼ tsp. vanilla
5 eggs yolks
1 cup flour
1½ cups white corn syrup
1 tsp. baking powder
Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Boil syrup until a little forms a firm soft ball when tested in cold water. Pour syrup slowly over egg whites beating all the while. Add lemon juice and vanilla. Beat until mixture will hold its shape. Fold in egg yolks which have been beaten until thick and

light colored. Fold in sifted dry ingredients. Bake in large ungreased tube pan in slow oven (325° F.) about 45 minutes.

Treasure Islands

6 slices sponge cake
2 egg whites
¼ tsp. salt
¼ cup nuts
2 tbsps. confectioner's sugar
½ cup dates

Cut sponge cake into ½ inch slices or into circles with a round cutter. Beat egg whites with salt until stiff; beat in the sugar, fold in dates which have been finely cut. Pile mixture lightly on the pieces of sponge cake. Sprinkle with chopped nuts. Bake in a slow oven (300° F.) until meringue is delicately brown or about 15 minutes. Serve warm or cold. Serves 6.
