LAW FOR TESTING DAIRY COWS PASSED

Testing of dairy cattle for infectious abortion will become compulsory under the terms of the act passed by the last session of the state legislature. The law provides that the act shall become operative January 1, 1936, and that testing of cattle shall commence at that time. In the event that the Federal Bang's disease indemnity program is continued into 1937, then the Oregon law does not become effective until January 1, 1937. Every bovine animal in the county must be tested for infectious abortion at least once every 12 months unless in the judgment of the state department of agriculture such testing is not necessary.

According to the law a Bang's disease inspector will be appointed by each county court. Pay for the inspector is to be paid by the county with the state paying for the ear tags and for the laboratory work in connection with the test. Indemnities will not be paid by either the state or counties and the owners of reacting cattle will not be required to dispose of such cattle except when the federal government is paying an indemnity. However, in all cases the infected cattle must be kept in quarantine and the law provides that it "shall be unlawful to hold or pasture a quarantined Bang's disease reactor animal within six feet of any neighboring cattle owner's property line which incloses any Bang's disease tested and free cows or susceptible cattle."

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GOOD CHILD AND THE SCHOOL

A Code for Child Health

While the industrial codes we read about may come and go, be popular or unpopular, a code for child health will always be a requisite of successful parenthood. Let us review the elements out of which such a code should be made.

I believe most parents would list first: the quart of milk daily, taken in different forms; two or more vegetables, with at least one the green leafy variety daily; some fresh fruit; meat, fish and eggs; and bread and butter.

The amount of sleep is important; restful, quiet sleep. The young child should have an afternoon rest in addition. Fresh air and sunshine must be in the health budget in liberal allotments. And the diminished sunshine of winter calls for one of the fish liver oils as a regular item in the code.

Be sure that the child's right to playtime is honored. Let nothing interfere with this natural heritage. Permit some time every day when the child may do as he pleases. Consider seriously the annual health examination by your family physician and dentist. Insure against smallpox and diphtheria. There are the routine daily health habits such as cleanliness and elimination to be added to the code. Finally do everything possible to bring happiness to the child and to make him feel secure and safe. Give him companionship; laugh with him; encourage his confidences.

Frost Warning Service Given
