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TEN YEARS AGO

DAD'S STORY

With pure hearts and clean hands we must come before the people, we who would write whether for the enlightenment of others or, as the old lady who sang said, "a little for my own amusement!"

So last week your scribe got an awful calling for printing that sketch at the end of our column, the sketch about the fellow who was trying to live on the income of his capital. First his income was \$700 per year, then \$425, and now it is cut to \$150 a year by order of the President through his secretary of the Treasury. A neighbor insists that the party we were talking about "still has his \$10,000!" Perhaps by our sketch he still has, but he does not have it if it costs him \$700 to live for the past year, and at the end of the present year his earning capacity will still have decreased considerably on account of depleted capital.

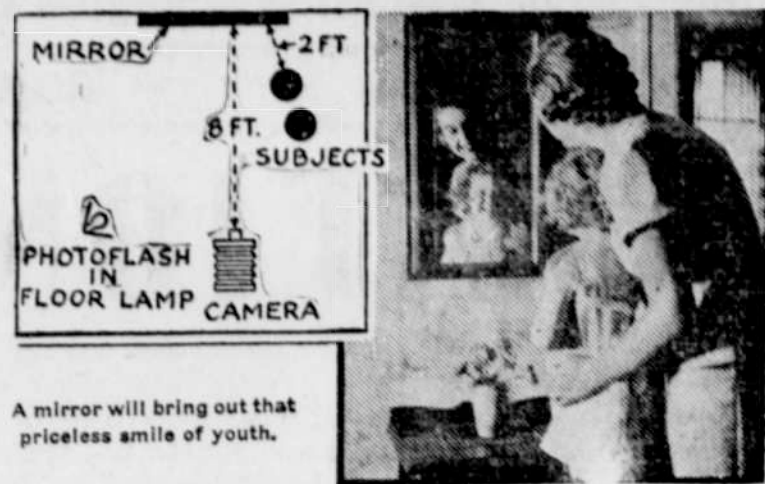
Had the subject of whom I wrote last week put his money in bonds, or stocks or in oil wells, or in a hundred different ways, he would not still have his \$10,000. No, nor even a small portion of it. But he invested in what always has been the most staple article on the market, real estate mortgages. And he lost and is still losing!

The deplorable thing about the whole matter is that he worked hard for his money. Up at four in the morning, he went to the barn, often in the dark, saved pennies by keeping everything right where he could walk up to it in the dark and put his hands on it; he used no light. Then eight o'clock in the evening found him milking his cows or getting to the house for his belated supper. That is how the one of whom I wrote got his \$10,000. He did not inherit it, he did not make it in the stock market, he did not get a corner on the wheat crop or the cotton supply. He toiled on a farm, early and late, denied himself even decent reading matter, though he always had sufficient nutritious food. But where he could he saved. Not a head of wheat went to waste, his corn he fed to hogs until the cholera took his pig crop, and then he fed steers or lambs. What he needed he purchased, but it was of the very best quality and it lasted. His buggy whip, if the younger generation knows what that is, was pure whalebone and cost him \$3.00, when he could have purchased one that looked similar for twenty five cents. He wore his overalls to town on business or when shopping, but when he went to church, as he did often, he wore broadcloth, a suit that lasted him years.

His wife worked, early and late, milked cows, planted, hoed, harvested, husked corn, cut corn, did anything and everything her strength allowed her to do. That is how they got their \$10,000. I never en-

CASTING REFLECTIONS



YOU may think you have exhausted the supply of picture possibilities in your home but the chances are that there are countless interesting subjects you have completely overlooked.

It is the unusual that attracts attention but it is necessary to use your eyes and a little imagination and ingenuity to ferret out these exceptional views, angles, etc., and get pictures that show individuality.

Mirror pictures, for instance, are intriguing and offer unlimited possibilities if one will do a little experimenting. Let's take the above picture as an example.

When focusing for reflected images only, it is necessary to add the distance from the mirror to the subject, to the distance from the mirror to the lens of the camera and then set the focus accordingly.

If it is desired to include the subject in the picture with the reflected image the focus should be set for the distance from the mirror to the lens. The smaller the lens opening the greater the depth of field and the sharper will be both images. Of course, the nearer the subject is to the mirror the less is required in the matter of "depth".

In the picture above, the subjects were about two feet and the camera six feet from the mirror. As both the subject and reflected image were to be included in the picture the focus was set at six feet. The diaphragm was set at f/16 and a photoflash furnished the light.

If the figures and camera were in a position to show only the re-

flected image in the picture being taken the focus would then have been set at the eight foot distance mark.

The diagram shows position of subjects, camera and photoflash when the above picture was taken. After setting the focus of your camera at the proper distance and the diaphragm at f/16 set the shutter for time exposure—"T". Do not have any bright lights in the room. Place photoflash lamp in ordinary floor lamp within reaching distance from the camera, as designated in diagram. Be sure to remove the shade from the lamp. Take your position at the camera and caution your subjects not to move. Press the cable release to open your shutter and immediately turn on the photoflash and then quickly close the shutter—and the picture has been taken. Photoflash lamps are made in two sizes, costing 15 and 25 cents each. For this type of picture the 25 cent size should be used.

In amateur photography experimenting becomes the spice of life and you will be surprised at the interesting effects you will get in working out "stunt" pictures on gloomy, rainy days when outdoor activities are taboo. Results in some instances may be rather grotesque but you will have a lot of inexpensive amusement and pictures that show individuality. Anyone can take the ordinary run of pictures but it requires a little ingenuity to get the unusual. That is what you should "shoot" for.
