TIME NOW FOR FIRST CODLING MOTH SPRAY

Apple and pear growers in the Willamette Valley should apply the first codling moth spray now for the control of codling moth, according to B. G. Thompson, entomologist, Oregon experiment station. For the past two evenings there has been a considerable flight of codling moths and eggs have been deposited. Under ordinary Willamette Valley weather conditions, these eggs will hatch in seven or eight days. The spray should be applied before these eggs hatch.

The recommended spray is powdered lead arsenate used at the rate of 3 pounds to 100 gallons of water. In orchards where codling moth is not a serious problem, two pounds of powdered lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water is sufficient to give control.

Calcium arsenate has been used successfully in the Willamette Valley for codling moth control. Tests carried on by the Entomology Department of the Oregon Experiment Station over a period of five years indicate that under Willamette Valley conditions calcium arsenate is only slightly less effective than lead arsenate in codling moth control.

Thoroughness of application is essential in codling moth control. The foliage as well as the entire surface of every apple and pear should be thoroughly covered with the spray solution if worm injury is to be prevented. Special care should be taken in spraying the upper portion of the tree, as more than half of the codling moth eggs are laid in the upper third of the tree.

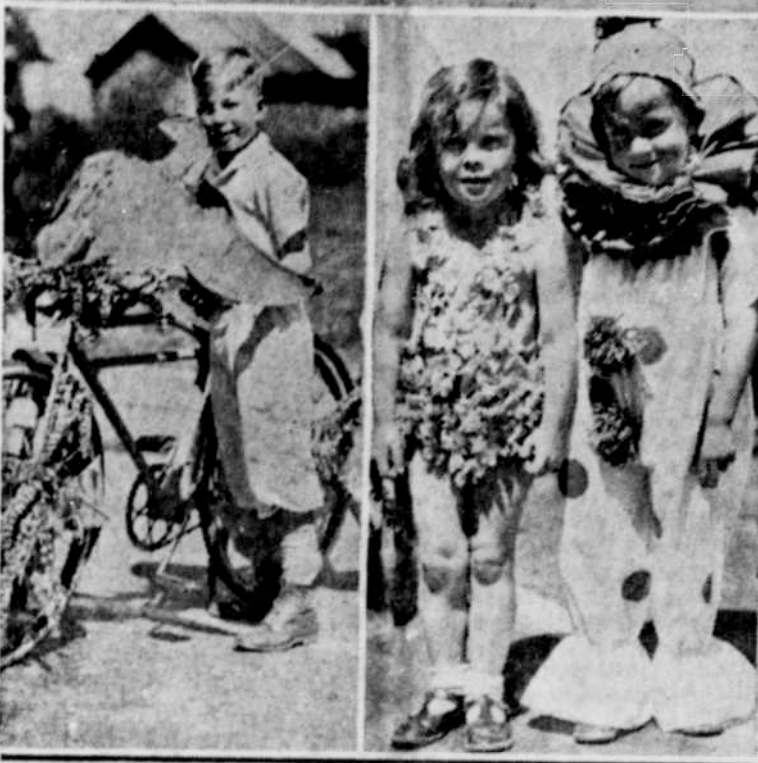
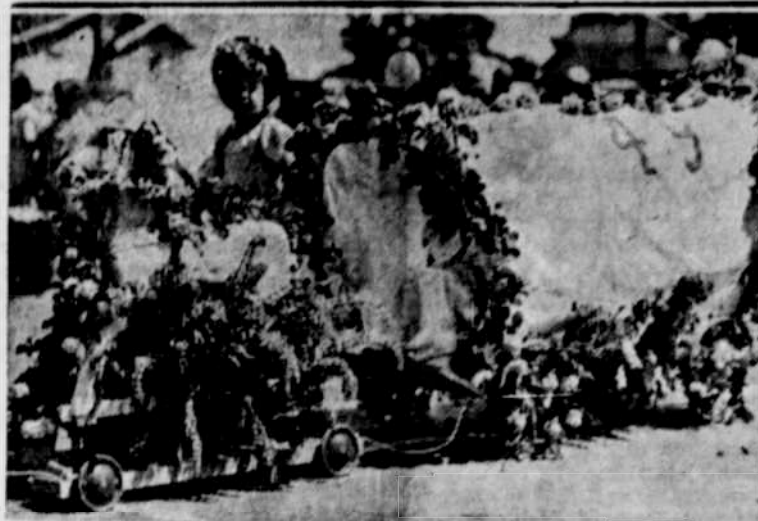

FIREMEN'S BALL HELD

Many See Beautiful Flowers Exhibited At Community Hall

Tuesday, June fourth, will be remembered for the many events put on by the citizens of the community. Among the events of the day were the Annual Flower show of the newly organized Beaverton Garden Club. This show was ready promptly at 11:00 a.m. when all the exhibits were in place and the judging began. It soon became evident that there were more classes of exhibits than had been anticipated and a hurry call was sent out for additional prizes for the larger number of classifications.

The parade formed promptly at 2:00 and the judging began there. Beaverton's annual Junior Floral parade exceeded all expectations, with its long line of floats of every description. Hundreds of residents of Beaverton and adjacent districts turned out to view the parade which was a veritable kaleidoscope of color and beauty wending its way along the line of march led by the Boy Scouts and the High School and Grade school bands. Many prizes were awarded the children for their novel and beautiful floats. The line of floats was interspersed with many clever characterizations which added much to the entertainment of the crowd.

The new fire truck manned with Beaverton's volunteer firemen followed the parade, winning much applause.

It is regrettable that we were unable to get the names of all the prize winners. But the number of exhibits was so great, the little tots held in line during the judging were subjected to such constraint, and the weather was so warm that it was thought best not to hold them longer in line before starting the parade. They began to move at 2:25 P. M. and followed the flags, the boy scouts and the bands down Watson to Broadway, east to East St., then doubling back along Broadway to Watson, then south to Second, then

west to the high school. It was a long march for some of the little tots with their elaborate floats.

FIVE SEED CORN TRIALS BEING MADE

Which of the two varieties of seed corn, Idaho Minnesota 13 or local Minnesota 13, produces the most tonnage and the best grade of silage? This is a question about which there is considerable difference of opinion among the Washington County farmers, states L. E. Francis, Assistant County Agent. Five trials are being carried on in the county to determine the answer. These trials are located on the farms of August Igel, Tualatin; J. W. Batchelar, Route 2, Hillsboro; Cecil Heyndrickx, Route 1, Cornelius; A. E. Krahmer, Route 2, Cornelius; and John Cordes, Route 1, Forest Grove. In each trial a quarter acre of local seed and a quarter acre of Idaho seed has been planted and at the time they are ready for the silo they will be cut and weighed. Records will be taken showing the relative weights of grain and fodder and total tonnage. Analyses will be made of silage from the two varieties of seed in order to determine which has the greater feeding value.

The real value of these trials, according to Francis, lies in the fact that if the local seed proves equal or superior to Idaho seed in the production of silage it should open a market for local seed and keep for the farmers of the county several hundred dollars which now goes out for outside seed.

Council Votes Lower City Water Rates

Minimum Charge Remains Same But Additional Is One Half Lower

BY-PASS TO BE BUILT

Ten Dollars a Month May be Given for Rehabilitation Employment

Steps were taken at this month's regular meeting of the City Council to lower the water rates in the residential districts of the city. While the minimum charge for water service was not lowered, other changes were made. The Council voted to sell the first six hundred feet at \$2.00 which is the same as has been for some time. Up to this time the next six hundred cubic feet has been charged at 30¢ per hundred feet and additional at 25¢ per hundred feet. Now the charge on additional use during the summer months will be just half of what it has been before, or the first six hundred feet will be \$2.00, the second six hundred feet will be at fifteen cents per hundred and the next additional will be at 12½¢ per hundred.

One can now use water for watering lawns and for irrigating gardens without its cost amounting to more than the average user can afford to pay. This reduction in rates means that the price of water used for watering and irrigation has been reduced 50%.

A letter from the County Court requested aid in financing the rehabilitation employment service which is being sponsored partly by the Federal Government. Heretofore the County has only had to pay \$25 per month to maintain this office, and the balance being made up from Federal funds. Now the County is asked to supply \$100 and the court has asked that the local municipalities make up the deficiency. The Council at this meeting voted to pay ten dollars per month to help make up the deficiency, provided the other municipalities in the county made up the balance of \$65.

A Class B package permit was voted to Geo. Thynge. This permit must be acted on by the State Liquor Control Board and if allowed will permit the sale of light wines and package goods which must not be consumed on the premises where sold.

A water by-pass was authorized for installation at the city reservoir. When this is installed, water can be pumped directly into the mains thus keeping the city supply always available in case the reservoir has to be rinsed out or repairs made on it. Heretofore when the reservoir was drained it was necessary to shut off the city's supply during the time the reservoir was being drained or repairs made.

TO DEMONSTRATE RODENT CONTROL

A rodent control demonstration will be held at the Sam Logan farm, 1½ miles east of Hillsboro on the Oak Street road, Friday, June 7, at 10 a.m., by L. E. Francis, Assistant County Agent. At this demonstration methods will be shown for poisoning and trapping gophers, moles, and gray squirrels. The demonstration is being sponsored in co-operation with the Agricultural Committee of the Hillsboro Grange. Anyone interested is welcome to attend.

WASHINGTON CO. COUNCIL MEETS HERE

The Washington County Council met in the Beaverton Grange hall Wednesday evening. Thirty members and visitors were present. Besides the regular Council reports, talks were given by Ray W. Gill, State Master, and George Palmer, State Deputy. The next meeting of the Council will be in the Sherwood Grange Hall, September 25, at 8:00 p.m.
