Carlton held its lead in the Tualatin Valley baseball league Sunday by defeating Amity, 13-6. Forest Grove took Newberg in, 14-2. Sherwood beat Verboort, 7-6 and Hillsboro got the better score in a clash with Vernonia, 2-1.

In the Washington County league Sunday, Garden Home got into the lead by taking North Plains, 11-5. Roy beat Gaston, 8-3; Banks beat Glenwood, 10-5; and Maplewood took Aloha, 14-5. And last we forget, Beaverton's star athlete and one-time pitcher, Mark Jones, is playing with Glenwood.

Aloha still maintains its lead in the Sunset league, having trounced Cornelius, 8-7; Sherwood bowed before Laurel, 2-3; Tualatin succumbed to Willamette, 4-7; Gaston trimmed Tigar, 13-7; and Orenco took Hillsboro's scalp, 14-7.

Sheriff Connell and Deputy Harry Johnson arrested six, one a woman, of the idle berry pickers in the vicinity of Banks, late last week. They were charged with the robbery of the J. B. Gibson home at Hillside.

Plans are under way for the establishment of cannery units for the benefit of people on relief. These units will be located at Hillsboro, Forest Grove, Tigard, and one at either Beaverton or Aloha. These units supply cans, sugar, etc. and the SERA will pay a supervisor.

The Salmon river highway is to be widened and improved if plans discussed at a meeting held last week at Sheridan are carried out. A Portland-Salmon River highway association was formed, officers elected and a campaign for membership started.

The dog strike broke out last week when E. Rhine swore out a complaint against Ezidor Kallek of Portland charging the latter with threatening to commit a felony. Kallek supplied a \$2,000 bail bond.

Cars going into ditches caused H. M. Mercer to get hurt when his machine was forced off the pavement near Sylvan by a milk truck, and Dorothy Heim of Hillsboro received injuries when the car in which she was riding attempted to pass a truck near Laurel.

Mrs. O. Neilson, living near Willsonville, sustained a multiple fracture of the fibula, the smaller bone of the lower leg, when she slipped and fell.

The vaults of the Seeley Mattress Co. and of the Tigard Lumber Co. were opened in Tigard Monday evening and from one the yeggs took eight cents, from the other they got \$1.50. Deputy Harry Johnson who visited the scene of the crimes, pronounced it the work of experts, for they never left a finger print by which they could be identified.

The 45-year old home of the Lyda family at Gales Creek was burned to the ground together with most of its contents, Wednesday. The loss is estimated at \$4,500.

The town of Banks is entertaining a considerable number of strawberry pickers. The two barrelling plants there started operations Saturday, and the recent rain will improve the crop so that Editor Paul Robinson's old slogan for Banks, "Banks is busy" will be quite appropriate.

**Silently Passing**

**THE REV. JOSEPH O'NEILL**  
Services were held at the local St. Cecelia's Catholic church, a week ago last Monday, for the Rev. Joseph O'Neill, former pastor. Solemn pontifical mass was said for him with the Most Rev. Edward D. Hoard, Catholic archbishop of Portland in Oregon, pontificating.

Interment was in Calvary cemetery, Portland.

The passing of Father O'Neill was deeply regretted by this community. He had been pastor of St. Cecelia's church here for more than twenty years.

He was born in Tipperary, Ireland, January 15, 1882, the son of Patrick F. O'Neill and Margaret O'Brien O'Neill. He attended the American college in Louvain, Belgium, and was ordained to the priesthood there July 11, 1909, by Bishop Gabriel.

He came immediately to this archdiocese. He was at first assistant at St. Lawrence's parish, in Portland, and later served at St. Luke's, Woodburn, McFord, Milwaukee, Hillsboro, and finally Beaverton.

**MANY CARS SOLD IN QUARTER YEAR**

The one million cars Henry Ford predicted his company would sell during 1935 was not just speculation on his part if V-8 sales for the first months of this year are indicative of the year's total volume.

According to H. H. Wilcox, Seattle Branch manager of the Ford Motor Company, national sales for the first quarter and up to April 10th, had totaled more than 334,000 cars and trucks, establishing a most enthusiastic country-wide acceptance for Ford.

"The Northwest is maintaining the same high record for sales which is so evident in all Ford branches throughout the country," said Wilcox. "During the first four months of this year, Ford sales totaled 9234 in this territory; this includes Ford V-8 passenger cars, trucks and commercial cars. This figure is 135% greater than for the same period of 1934, and our April volume was the greatest for that month since the peak year of 1929."

Nation-wide sales so far this year are already considerably in excess of the volume for the entire year of 1932. To demonstrate the activity at Dearborn this year, the Ford Motor Company recently announced that an all-time record in the purchase of materials and supplies for Ford V-8 was set in March when the bills totaled \$81,000,000. In the same month the Ford payroll totaled \$16,500,000.
