Fertilizer Helps Cover Crops

Dallas—Cover crops in Polk county orchards are beginning to show the beneficial effects of top-dressings with a nitrogenous fertilizer in February, reports County Agent J. R. Beck. Several different kinds of fertilizer were applied about the middle of February. A number of these demonstration trials are located along well travelled roads in the vicinity of Dallas, and Mr. Beck is planning on putting up road signs so that interested parties may locate them easily.

An Invitation to the Coroner

Your chances of being involved in a fatal automobile accident are much greater on highways than anywhere else. Bad as the urban accident rate is, the death toll is mounting fastest in rural territories, even though traffic is less dense. Last year 167,000 accidents occurred on highways. The result was 160,000 injuries—and 13,000 deaths. By contrast, 286,000 city accidents caused but 8,000 deaths. In 1934, the rate of death per accident on highways was more than 100 per cent greater than the average for all accidents combined.

The reason isn't hard to find. The modern highway is wide and smooth, rarely congested. It looks as safe as your own back yard. And, as a consequence, thousands of drivers relax behind the wheel, and step hard on the accelerator. When a crisis arrives, they react too slowly, or are going too fast to avoid a smash—and death follows.

That is especially worth remembering now, with the appearance of summer. Most motorists will be making trips into the country—and they should keep in mind the unhappy fact that somnolence on the highway is an invitation to the coroner.

Plants Grass and Forage Nursery

Moro—A demonstration trial of a number of different kinds of grasses and forage crops has been seeded on the Ronald Macnab farm north of Wasco in co-operation with County Agent Perry N. Johnston. Included are sweet clover, Grimm alfalfa, Ladak alfalfa, crested wheatgrass, orchard grass, smooth brome, slender wheat, native bunch grass, desert alkali, little blue grass, bulbous blue grass, Idaho fescue, tall fescue, western wheat, ermine bunch grass, and a plot of crested wheat grass with a five per cent seeding of sweet clover.

Developing Angus Cattle Herd

McMinnville—The development of an Aberdeen Angus herd is under way on the 22,000 acre ranch owned by W. Crowell of Grand Ronde, reports County Agent S. T. White. Mr. Crowell now has between 300 and 400 head.

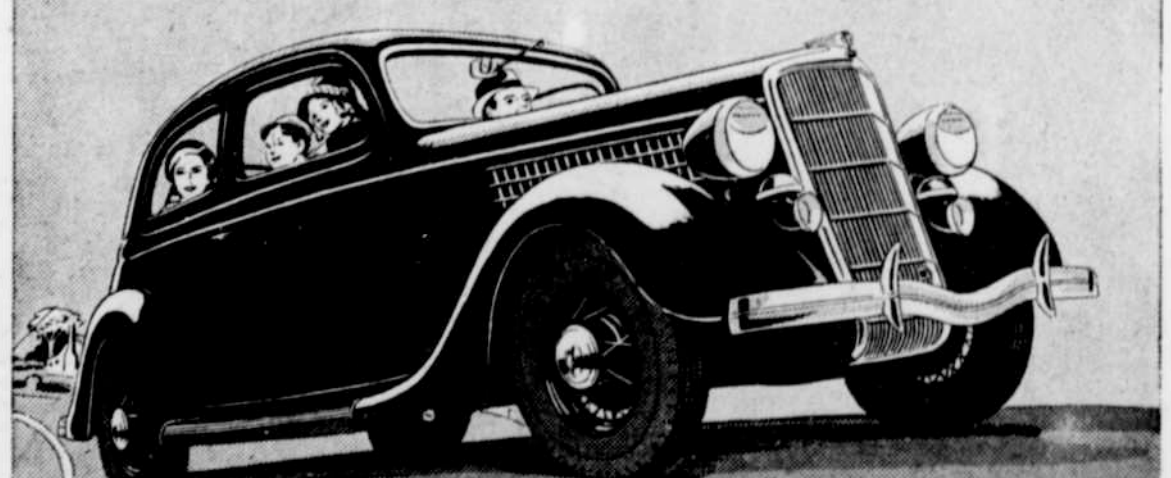


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
