Greetings to you:

I am conscious of such a pleasantly happy feeling today, and the direct cause of that feeling is a letter from one of you who took the time to write me a few very lovely words of understanding appreciation for the things I have written as Mary-Martha. You know, dear readers, we are only of late beginning to understand the psychological effect of a bit of praise. Not so very many years ago it was thought inadvisable to say complimentary things to people, and especially to children, lest they become vain. I have known families where a kindly word of praise was never given a child, no matter how well a task was performed, and the effect was certainly nothing to recommend the practice.

We jest a bit about the husband who pays his compliments to his wife only in her tombstone, but I rather believe that most of us are guilty of neglect when it comes to saying the many pleasant things which are due, especially to those of our own families. Think over this day carefully. Did you commend your children for their good work, or did you overlook the satisfactory accomplishment and mention only the part left undone? Did you give that husband a bit of a caress and a word of appreciation, or did you "jaw" at him for leaving his shoes on the floor?

I wonder how many keep their tactful courtesy for the stranger or the chance acquaintance, and give their brack criticisms and rude or careless comments to those whom they really love? That such is a common practice is one of the ironical things of life, and one which is deeply to be regretted, for a gentle, kindly, tactful courtesy in the home is truly a sweet and perfumed oil on troubled domestic waters.

Most of us will work harder under the stimulus of words of praise than we will under the lash of criticism; yet too often—and without cause—do the criticisms outnumber the commendations. An editor once told me that if his readers liked his stuff they never took the trouble to tell him, but let him print something of which they disapproved and the letters simply poured in. It is the same way with our neighbors, our friends; how often do we go out of our

way to send a little note of appreciation, to commend a worthy action, an accomplished result. Very seldom. We accept the good as a matter of course and wait until the person is dead and then try to say it with flowers.

Let us not put off doing and saying these kindly things, O Mary-Martins. Let us start in now to say the word of appreciation, to write that letter of congratulation we have thought of, to let those about us know that we really do love them and realize their thoughtfulness and kindnesses, let us give our children that extra caress, that tender word of loving praise. Don't let us wait too long. In an old poem translated from the Arabic we hear of the three things which come not back:

"Remember three things come not back:

The arrow sent upon its track—It will not savor, it will not stay its speed; it flies to wound, to slay.

The spoken word so soon forgot By thee; but it has perished not; In other hearts 'tis living still. And doing work for good or ill. And the lost opportunity That cometh back no more to thee, In vain thou weepst, in vain dost yearn.

These three will nevermore return." Time passes so swiftly, my dears, those lost opportunities will never come again, and someday our hearts may be heavy because of the loving words we have left unsaid, the caresses we were too busy to give, or the letter we had no time to write.

\$10,000 Worth of Forage Saved
Lakeview—Livestock men of Lakeview estimate that at least \$10,000 worth of forage has been saved this spring by the poisoning of ground squirrels on 250,000 acres of land. The poisoning was done by four crews of men working most of the month of June under the supervision of J. P. Branson of the U. S. Biological survey, in cooperation with CCC camps, the Fremont National Forest Service and the county agent's office.

Tropical Cousins Ought to Know

What's Good to Eat When It's Hot Turn to the tropics to know what to eat when it's hot. To the countries just over the equator, hot weather is no novelty but a steady diet. It would appear that after years of practise our tropical cousins "ought to know", and it seems logical to take a look at (and a taste of) their favorite foods.

Of course, lack of refrigeration facilities and a scantier variety of foods makes tropical fare less varied. We are not so hampered, but plan our menus from dozens more vineyards, and have a stock of cold and frozen dishes unknown to our southern friends.

Our ideas of flavor vary too, so that many a native from a southern land would fail to recognize his pet dish. But adaptations and Americanized versions of tropical foods, and our own combinations of their tropical ingredients are plentiful, pleasing, popular!

"The sands of the desert grow cold" according to a popular song, but the sun shines hot in Arabia. There grow the palm trees that make our cooling fare—dates. The Arabs like their dates plain and pick them right off the tree, but we put them in salad, desserts, even ice cream.

You'll enjoy these:

Tropical Mousse

1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup dates, chopped
Grated rind of 1/2 lemon
1 1/2 cups lemon juice
Few grains salt
1/4 tsp. nutmeg
1/3 cup powdered sugar
2 ripe bananas
1 cup heavy cream
Mix the nuts, finely chopped dates, lemon rind and juice, salt, nutmeg, and sugar. Mash the bananas; add to the first mixture. Beat the cream until thick but not stiff, combine with the remaining ingredients. Freeze in the trays of a mechanical refrigerator or in a mold packed in equal parts of ice and salt until firm. (3 to 4 hours). 8 servings.

Arabian Nights Salad

1/2 cup gelatin
1/3 cup grapefruit juice
1 cup whipping cream
1/3 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup pecans
1 No. 1 can grapefruit
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 cup chopped figs
1/2 cup dates, chopped
2 tbsps. minced preserved ginger
Soak gelatin in grapefruit juice, dissolve over hot water, cool. Whip cream, fold in dissolved gelatin, mayonnaise, salt, and the remaining ingredients (which have been cut in small pieces). Freeze in trays of a mechanical refrigerator, in a mold packed in equal parts of ice and salt for about 4 hours. Unmold on a bed of lettuce and serve with cream mayonnaise. 12 servings.

In India, and in most tropical countries, curry powder enhances most main dishes, and is served on delicious rice. Don't "lean" on the curry too heavily at first or you'll think the only cooling part is after you stop eating! Serve with chutney.

Bombay Curried Chicken

1 cup boiled rice
2 tbsps. flour
Salt and pepper
1 1/2 cups chopped cooked chicken
2 tbsps. butter
2 cups milk
2/3 tsp. curry powder
Prepare a white sauce from the fat, flour and milk. Add seasonings, chicken and rice. Serve hot in chamekins. This is excellent if rice is used for crostade and the chicken

ken curry is served in the crostade. 6 servings.

Mexican Dressing

Mix 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/4 teaspoon curry power, and 1/4 tsp. paprika together. Add 1/4 cup vinegar and 1/2 cup salad oil and beat thoroughly. Then add 2 hard cooked egg yolks pressed through a sieve and blend thoroughly.

People everywhere like bananas in the summer time, although this fruit is a year 'round friend and not confined to warm weather menus. While our own native cooks are right now combining sliced ripe bananas and oxtart cherries or other fruit for cool salads, and fruit cups, they are making pancakes with them in the West Indies! These are good for a main course at Sunday night supper.

West Indian Pancakes

1/2 cup flour
2 tbsps. sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
1 egg, well beaten
1/2 cup milk
2 bananas
Sift dry ingredients. Add milk to beaten egg and stir slowly into flour mixture until smooth. Pour onto hot, well-greased griddle. Drop a few slices of banana on top of each cake. Brown on one side, then on the other. Sprinkle with powdered sugar or garnish with jelly. Makes six medium-sized pancakes.
