Oregon Farmers

Crimson Clover Seed Harvested
Albany—Nine Lion county farmers this year harvested the first crimson clover to be grown for seed in the county, according to county Agent F. C. Mullen. The new crop was cut late in June and yields are varied from 400 to 1000 pounds of seed per acre, with prices ranging from 5 1-2 to 7 cents a pound. Seedlings were all made early last fall. Farmers growing the crop this year were Floyd Jenks, Pierce Jenks, W. C. Scott and J. L. McFarland, all of Tanc; Noah Shelby and Ed Holle way of Albany, and Gerald Workinger and L. O. Webber of Shedd. This is a new disease resistant strain developed at the Oregon experiment station which is believed to have unusual possibilities.

Giving the different localities, not loaning to them, GIVING to them. Following is a list of Oregon cities with the amounts of bonds they have already voted to spend in this Public Works program: Halsey, Union High school, \$28,750, and grade school, \$30,500, totalling \$59,250; Harrisburg Union High, \$9,000; Amity, \$19,000; Carver, \$6,500; Lebanon, \$16,000; Corbett, \$17,000; Rockwood, \$18,000; Dallas, \$47,000; (the plans for the above

buildings are being handled through the office of C. N. Freeman, Portland architect) Albany, \$160,000; Sheridan, \$30,000; Lakeview, \$15,000.

These cities have made applications for PWA grants, and some of them have already voted bonds (if available, amounts are given): Baker, \$140,000; Monmouth, \$54,000; Grants Pass, \$45,000; Eugene, \$13,000; Aloha, \$50,000; Clatskanie; Seaside; Warrenton; Tillamook; Nehalem; Linn county, \$285,000; Garibaldi; Bay City; Willamina; Carlton; Newberg; Cornelius; McMinnville.

Do you want any of that money, that \$4,800,000,000, spent here? If you do, you had better vote the bonds. If you don't, why vote against the bonds. You are the sole judge. Do what you think is best for yourself, for your home, for your community.
