COUNTY HERDS ARE STATE FAIR FEATURE

One of the new and interesting features of the 4-H department at the Oregon State Fair which will be held August 31 to September 7, will be the county herds, reports L. E. Francis, assistant county agent. These county herds are made up within each breed and consist of five animals of any age and owned by three or more club members of the county. The purpose of this new dairy class is to encourage the various counties to enter more and better livestock at the fair. In past years Washington County has always had a good representation in the dairy exhibits at the state fair and will probably stand high in the county herd competition this year. The breed specialists which are being awarded at the State Fair this year consist of four gifts, three dairy heifers and four ewe lambs.

Last year Washington County had 31 exhibits in the 4-H livestock and crops division of the State Fair. Livestock, crops, poultry, and rabbit judging teams were entered in the judging contests and livestock, crops and miscellaneous demonstration teams were entered in the demonstration contests. These various contests will be entered again by an equal number of teams.

The schedule of events at the State Fair which will be of interest to Washington county people is as follows: Monday, September 2—7:30 a.m., livestock judging contest; 1:30 p.m., judging of dairy cattle; 3:00 p.m., poultry judging contest; 6:30 p.m., rabbit judging contest.

Tuesday, September 3—9:00 a.m., judging of garden exhibits; 1:30 p.m., judging of sheep, goats, poultry and rabbits.

Wednesday, September 4, 9:00 a.m., Washington county livestock demonstration; 1:30 p.m., judging of hogs.

Thursday, September 5—9:00 a.m., Washington county crops demonstration; 9:00 a.m., hog showman-ship; 10:00 a.m., sheep showman-ship; 1:30 p.m., cattle showman-ship.

Friday, September 6—11:00 a.m., Washington county miscellaneous demonstration; 7:00 p.m., special awards. The special awards are made in the main arena at the night horse show.

ANIMALS AT FAIR MUST BE TESTED

Forty head of 4-H dairy animals were tested recently by Drs. E. W. Coon of Forest Grove and R. J. Nicol, of Hillsboro, according to L. E. Francis, Assistant County Agent. Each year the dairy animals over six months of age that are shown at the county fair are tested for abortion within 30 days prior to the fair date.

In an effort to support the federal and state abortion program this year, the dairy leaders decided to place further restrictions on animals coming to the county fair and it is now required that all animals over six months of age be tested within 30 days prior to the fair date and that they also come from a herd that has had at least one clean test.

SIXTY MEMBERS ON CLUB JUDGING TOUR

Sixty club members attended the livestock and crops judging tour which was held August 21, 23, and 24, according to L. E. Francis, assistant county agent.

The purpose of the judging tour was to give the club members an opportunity to get some practice in judging livestock and crops preparatory to their entering the judging contests which will be held at the county fair this week.

Jersey, Guernsey and Holstein cattle, Shropshire sheep and Duroc Jersey and Chester White hogs were the breeds of livestock judged.

Saturday, the group met in the basement of the courthouse where they were instructed in judging grain and truck crops and also grading potatoes.

Coupe Hits Sedan In Canyon Road Accident

Three Are Arrested and Taken To The County Seat By Police

CAR BADLY DISABLED

Automobile Driven By John Knepper Is Little Damaged

As Johnny Knepper was driving on the Canyon road in Beaverton just east of Cedar street he slackened speed to turn into the Alexander service station when a Ford coupe coming at rather a fast gait hit his sedan in the rear, breaking off the bumper and jamming up an auto trunk.

The Ford was badly disabled and bystanders who gathered quickly shoved it off the highway. A man in the seat was bleeding profusely and a girl, also in the coupe's seat had blood on her face.

Some one put in a call for the police and soon A. M. Pratt, State Policeman, showed up and began to check up on the accident. He listened to Knepper's story and then began to question the driver of the coupe who offered him a license, and answered a few questions. Soon the cop stated, "You are under arrest. This isn't your driver's license." It happened that the policeman knew the owner of the license. He telephoned Sheriff Connell's office in Hillsboro, and asked for a car to take the three occupants of the coupe to jail.

Evidence in the coupe tended to show that the man had been injured before the collision. The driver's name was E. B. Hendricks and the injured is Joe Mione, both of Carlton. Both men were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Thye Monday and were released on bail set at \$250.00 each.

POTATOES INSPECTED FOR CERTIFICATION

One hundred and forty-six acres of potatoes for 24 growers were inspected for certification last week. This is a smaller acreage than has been inspected for certification in the last three years, but the decrease in acreage is probably a good thing as the market for Burbank seed has decreased. The last year or two there has been just too much of this variety grown for good purposes.

Growers now are growing a wider variety than they have done in the past. A few years ago practically everything was Burbanks with just a sprinkle of Nelted Gems. Today, most of the acreage is still Burbanks, but there is an appreciable acreage of other varieties notably Early Rose, White Rose, Garnet, Bliss Triumph, and Katahdin. Some of these have been grown for a number of years but this is the first year that there has been any acreage that could amount to anything that could be approved for certification. Some of these fields may be rejected on the second inspection, sometime in September, but they are relatively clean at this time.

OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMS TO BE HELD

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations as follows: Bacteriologists, various grades, \$3,200 to \$4,600 a year; cytologists, various grades, \$3,200 to \$4,600 a year; epidemiologists, various grades, \$3,200 to \$4,600 a year; mycologists (medical), \$4,600 a year; U. S. Public Health Service, Treasury Department.

Refuge superintendent, \$3,800 a year, associate refuge manager, \$3,200 a year, assistant refuge manager, \$2,300 a year, Bureau of Biological Survey, Department of Agriculture.

Sheet metal worker, \$1,680 a year, departmental service, Washington, D.C.
