Beaverton Eleven Defeats Vernonia

First Points Scored By Opponents Are Due To Many Fumbles Made

FINAL SCORE IS 13-7

Long Pass And Forty-Yard Run Make First B.H.S. Touchdown

A fine day for the game last Friday when the amiable Beavertonians met the Vernonia loggers on the new high school field here. The Beavers came from behind to win the game 13-7 after the visitors had crossed the local goal for the first time this year on the local field. Three fumbles in the first half cost the locals the score against them although Vernonia really put the ball over after a delayed line plunge which netted them 30 yards.

When the writer arrived on the ground the game had begun and Vernonia had the ball near the center of the field. On first down they attempted left end. No gain; then again left end, making about a yard. A right end run netted them little and they punted to the Beaverton 20 yard line where it was taken back to the forty.

Here the locals first tried left end for no gain; they tried the same tactics as Vernonia and repeated the charge round left end and got only about a yard. Then down a punt-former pass netted them some 12 yards. At first down this time the locals tried tackle but were held for no gain. A center pass was fumbled and the visitors got the ball and brought it back to about the locals' 30 yard line.

Here the loggers got through center for about 4 yards, then 2 yards in the same place. They seemed fond of repeating their plays. A charge around right end netted them just enough for a first down. The locals stiffened and another try through left tackle lost the visitors about a yard. They tried a pass which was intercepted giving the locals possession of the ball.

With a stiffened line a charge through left tackle netted six yards. Then center gave way four yards and the locals had a first down. They were over right tackle for five yards and then around left end for 20 yards where they were forced outside the field. On the very next try a fumble which was recovered by the visitors lost the locals 10 yards. The loggers then got over center for about 8 yards and a completed pass netted them some four yards. This closed the quarter.

In the second quarter, with the visitors holding the ball, five yards at center, 2 at right tackle and 4 at center gave them another first down. Another try at right tackle got 2 yards. A pass was knocked down but another this time a lateral, gave them 3 yards. They punted out of bounds on the locals' 18 yard mark.

Beaverton tried right tackle for a yard gain then punted to about their thirty-five yard stripe. The visitors there took the ball, tried right tackle for 3 yards, and got through center with a delayed back for a score. They converted by means of a line back.

On the kick-off Beaverton received on their 28 yard line but did not get any return. B. Sipe was injured on this play, about the only injury during the game. The locals got over right tackle for a yard, but on secondary a pass was knocked down. They then punted and the ball came to rest on the loggers' 40 yard line with the visitors in possession. Here Vernonia took time out. On resumption of play, the loggers lost a yard but (Continued on Back Page)

Co. BRED BULL WINS NAT'L RECOGNITION

A Washington county Guernsey Bull, Khedive Kitchener of Sequim Prairies 75564, bred by W. A. Good-

ing of Cornelius, and owned by Ben H. Ridgeway of Sequim, Washington, has just won national recognition.

Khedive Kitchener of Sequim Prairie, having two daughters which have made creditable official records, has been entered in the Advanced Register of the American Guernsey Cattle Club and will be known hereafter as an Advanced Register sire. Only Guernseys which meet high production requirements are eligible for entry. The two daughters which have completed official records are Khedive's Beauty 212768 producing 14,099.9 pounds of milk and 656.1 pounds of fat in class AA, and Ben's May June of Sequim Prairie 193333 producing 12,519.1 pounds of milk and 602.2 pounds of fat in class A.

WHEAT CONTRACTS WILL BE PRESENTED

Applications for new wheat contracts will be presented at meetings to be held Saturday, Monday and Tuesday, November 2, 4 and 5, with the essential data already in them. This has been taken from the old contract and compliance forms. Any operator of a farm that grew wheat during the years 1930, 1931 or 1932 will be eligible to sign a new wheat contract. As far as is known at this time the wheat base for the new contract will be the same as for the old one. The amount of reduction is changed, the use of contracted acreage is a little more stringent and the method of determining the total amount of the payment has been slightly changed. The explanation of the new set-up need not take much time.

FIRST ORE. ENTRY IN SHOW FROM THIS Co.

First entry from Oregon for the International Grain and Hay Show, to be held at Chicago in connection with the International Live Stock Exposition November 30 to December 7, was made by E. M. Scott, of Washington county.

Scott will exhibit samples of oats that he has raised this year on his farm near Sherwood.

Among the entries for the 1935 International Grain and Hay Show are those of seven wheat growers in New South Wales. The Australian entries have already arrived in the United States and are being inspected by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in Washington, preparatory to being forwarded to Chicago.

The Exposition management announces that entries for the crops show will be accepted until November 10th. There is no charge for entry and samples will be returned to exhibitors if requested. The show will provide 91 different classes for corn, small grains, seeds and hay. Cash premiums will be given on all prize winning samples.

Secretary-manager E. H. Heide of the International Live Stock Exposition, predicts a record-breaking entry of both livestock and crops this year. Preparations are being made, he says, to house more than 12,000 animals in the new two million dollar amphitheatre constructed last year as a permanent home for the Exposition at the Chicago Stock Yards.

BANQUET TO HONOR COUNTY PHYSICIANS

County physicians will be honored Monday evening at the annual doctors' banquet sponsored by the Washington County Public Health association at the Hillsboro Knights of Pythias hall. Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the state tuberculosis hospital at Salem and Dr. Mary Bissell will be the principal speakers. Dr. J. O. Robb of Hillsboro will be toastmaster.
