Beaverton Eleven Defeats Vernonia

got it back over right tackle on the next play. They punted on third down and Beaverton fumbled the ball leaving the Loggers in possession at the half.

In the second half the Locals opened up an air attack which had the visitors gaping. Beaverton received the ball on their 20 yard, and returned it 20 yards. A pass on first down netted them 14 yards, and a first down. Right end netted 3 yards but on second down they dropped the ball and you could see dismay written all over the local fans' faces. They had cheered up a little on that return and pass. But the locals recovered this time with no loss.

A long pass to an end that had not joined the line on the play allowed him to get into the open where he ran almost 40 yards to score. A pass to the end zone added the extra point and the score was tied, 7 all.

The locals began to pile up the yardage then, but two costly fumbles in this half cost them opportunities to get away. They, however, played brilliant ball mixing their plays and calling in many tricks and fake formations seldom brought into play by the locals who usually put on simple straight football. But they had tied the score and just would not be denied victory. A delayed buck followed by the old hidden ball play brought the ball well down the field but a pass was intercepted.

At the quarter it was the visitors' ball and they punted only to have Beaverton fumble again, but the kick was short and the visitors punted again on first down but only to the middle of the field. A delayed buck brought it to the Vernonia 38 line. The next play netted 12 yards. Then settling down to straight football they got to the one foot line on third down and shoved it over but a line buck failed to add the extra point, and the score stood 13-7 where it stayed to the end of the game.

Still those fumbles kept creeping in and it was only by the hard work and quick wit of the Be-

averton boys that they were able to keep the jinx down and hold the long end of the score. Next to the last play a Beaverton pass was intercepted in midfield but the catcher was stopped with no gain. The game ended right after Vernonia, having intercepted the pass tried to get one of their own away but it was knocked down.
