RULES AND PENALTIES OF FOOTBALL

In order that every fan might further enjoy football games the following penalties are explained:

1. Passer less than five yards behind scrimmage line when making forward pass.
2. Incomplete forward pass.
3. Interference by passing team on forward pass (also 15 yards).

Loss of the Ball

1. Failure to advance ball 10 yards in four downs.
2. Interference by team not making forward pass.
3. Kicking team illegally touching ball.
4. Forward pass touched by ineligible player.

Loss of Five Yards

1. Offside (down remains the same).
2. Illegal delay (down remains same).
3. More than three time-outs by a team during half (down remains same).
4. Backfield in motion.
5. Holding by defensive team.

Loss of 15 Yards

1. Clipping.
2. Holding by offensive team.
3. Piling a ball carrier.
4. Failure to come to full second stop in shift play.

those present declared it was one of the most valuable set of findings in recent years in this field.

Professor Gage's volume goes thoroughly into the economic phases of the problem of assurance of land titles, a field in which investigation heretofore has been very meager. A study of the development of devices to aid in securing greater marketability of land titles has been the theme of the work.

Professor Gage fully qualifies as an authority in the field of land titles. He came to the university of Oregon in 1929, after serving

for two years with the mortgage Guarantee company and Security Title Insurance and Guarantee company of Los Angeles. He spent the summer of 1932 at the University of Munich where he studied land title transfer methods in Europe. He then spent two years in graduate study at the University of Michigan under Dr. Ernest M. Fisher, outstanding authority on real estate.

Professor Gage plans to publish the book in a form that will be available to the general public as well as experts.
