Thanksgiving day until Christmas. As Health Nurse employed by the County I have been asked to tell something of the work which these seals help to accomplish.

The intangible results of increased interest in health, and of an encouraged outlook and intelligent public, which cannot be tabulated, are in my opinion the outstanding results but there are some figures taken from the records of the Association, teachers' reports and Health Department which are indicative.

In the 2 years past 1500 children were given the Tuberculin test at Beaverton, Sherwood, Tigard, Forest Grove, Hillsboro, etc. As a result of this testing the conclusion has been drawn that approximately 8% of high school students and 3% of grade school children have mild infection with tuberculosis, a figure which compares very favorably with students of the U. S. as a whole, who show about 20%.

Suitable X-ray following positive tests revealed that nearly all were of a slight degree and reasonable precautions as to hygiene and diet would insure a normal life.

To a few families however, the test proved of vital importance because it brought to light the early stages of disease at a time when prompt action was needed and was not yet too late.

Christmas seals were also used to help finance X-rays, purchases supplies for school "clinics" and secure educational matter for distribution.

Such a record is encouraging and there is a tendency to relax and call our task done; but there are some black figures recorded: 1934 was the first in 20 years that the Oregon death rate from T.B. rose and did not fall, due in part to the depression.

In the past two years 130 Washington County families have been found to have been in contact with the active disease and 48 individuals of this county have been under medical care for active tuberculosis (with T.B. germs in their sputum); of these 48, 10 have died, 14 have a good chance to recover, 18 are still active, and 6 have moved or their condition is not known.

Are we not justified in pressing to think upon some of the following questions?

How many persons are there not included on this list?

Who are they?

Where are they?

Who are they endangering?

What is their occupation? Student? Teacher? Farmer? Mill worker? Housewife? Each such occupation was included in the list of 48.

When you purchase Christmas seals you are helping to find the early case and helping to make adequate treatment possible, you are helping to spread the happy news that consumption is old-fashioned and unnecessary and the same disease by the newer name of Tuberculosis is preventable and is curable.

"WHAT WILL ALOHA DO?"

"There is an opportunity to procure Federal aid in cleaning the big creek north of Aloha-Huber if taken up with WPA authorities immediately.

"The creek west of Huber, Elmonica road, is full of logs, brush and other debris. There should be an organized effort to clean up this stretch of ditch to Rock Creek junction south of Tualatin on the O. E. Ry.

"Beaverton drainage district have had 20 men working on their creek getting same in great shape for better drainage and earlier crops. What do you say Aloha-Huber. Let's make it Rock Creek!"—Beaverton Enterprise.

Now isn't that nice? Aloha, by following the Enterprise's advice can "Get Federal aid in cleaning up the big creek". You know that will be just fine.
