On Oregon Farms

Water Increases Seed Yield
Hillsboro—Irrigation of a field of red clover gave an average seed yield approximately seven times as great as on an unirrigated field that had, if anything, a little better soil on the farm of John Thornburgh at Forest Grove, he reported recently to County Agent W. F. Cyrus. The seed crop from the unirrigated field averaged 55 pounds per acre, and on the irrigated field 355 pounds per acre. At 35 cents a pound for seed, this meant a gross return of \$39 an acre from the irrigation. Mr. Thornburgh now has a major part of his land under irrigation and has recently laid out an additional 35 acres to receive supplemental water.

Will Feed Sheep Small Grains
Lakeview—Five Lake county sheep men are planning to co-operate with County Agent Victor W. Johnson in testing out the advisability of feeding small grains to their sheep bands on the desert this winter instead of the usual corn. With small grains such as barley and oats selling locally for \$15 to \$20 a ton, and No. 2 yellow dent corn costing about \$45 a ton laid down at Lakeview, a substantial saving in feed costs could be made if the plan is effective, it is pointed out.

bunch of envelopes. They extend them to the housewife, telling her it is lucky enough to draw one containing a "special advertising coupon" she will get a photograph enlargement absolutely free. The trick lies in the fact that practically every one of the envelopes contain a lucky coupon.

The coupon used by one such company says:

"This certificate entitles the holder to one portrait 10 x 16 inches in size absolutely free, for the purpose of extending and advertising our business. The only condition is that you purchase the frame for this portrait from us."

The condition is printed in ordinary type and is often overlooked by the customer.

There are many variations of the photo enlargement scheme. THE PURPOSE OF ALL OF THEM IS TO SELL FRAMES. The enlargements may be technically free, but complaints in the files of the Portland Better Business Bureau prove that it is hard to get back even the original photograph unless one buys a frame.
