Interest Shown In New Wheat

Bend—Deschutes county farmers are showing considerable interest in a trial planting of 5.3 acres of Hybrid 63 winter wheat grown on the farm of M. A. LOW-GRADE PRUNES USED IN BY-PRODUCTS

Oregon and other Pacific Coast sub-standard dried prunes are to be removed from the regular market through a program arranged by the Pacific Coast prune industry and the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. The plan is to dispose, through by-products channels, of from 20,000 to 25,000 tons of sub-standard prunes from the last two crops, according to details of the plan received by Oregon State college extension service officials.

The arrangement is made possible because of the provisions of recent amendments to the Agricultural Adjustment act which makes available 30 per cent of the gross receipts from customs duties to be used to encourage exports of agricultural products or their domestic consumption as by-products.

The program was proposed by prune growers of the Pacific coast who organized for the purpose the Pacific Prune Producers' association. With money advanced by the Reconstruction Finance corporation, this association will purchase the sub-standard prunes on a schedule of minimum prices to be approved by the secretary of agriculture. The association will then process the prunes where necessary and offer them for sale at prices not below an approved schedule. The difference in the price paid for the prunes plus the cost of handling and the price received will be made up from customs funds.

Actual administrative costs of op-

erating the plan, however, will be met by an assessment of \$1 per ton to be deducted from the purchase price paid the grower. The money advanced by the RFC will thus be returned from the proceeds of the three sources.

The Personal Touch

DO you think that if you had to you could tell a lie so cleverly that no one, no matter how clever he was, could find you out? I'd have said that some people could, but I'm not so sure now. I've been reading an interview with Dr. William Moulton Marston, the psychologist, who is most widely known as the inventor of the so-called "lie detector." (The interview—you don't catch me lying or holding anything back after this!—is published

Tough on Liars

Here are some quotes from Dr. Marston: The real lie detector is the person who operates the lie detecting apparatus and who makes a judgment of "true" or "false" according to results shown in the records. There's no trick about it, nothing new in the way of intricate machinery of mysterious hocus-pocus. (It's all based on the same kind of blood-pressure test which any doctor can make.) Giving deception tests successfully takes merely experience, understanding of human emotions—and common sense.

No Hope for Experts
When people tell unimportant lies or when people are expert liars, they've enough self-control to prevent the bodily symptoms of deception from appearing openly on the surface. But nobody can prevent slight changes in heart-beats, breathing, and so on from occurring when he lies, though these changes may be so well hidden that we can detect them only with laboratory instruments. It makes no difference how trivial the lie may be; the heart beats a little harder, a little more forcefully, and raises the blood-pressure.

Fear or excitement on the part of the subject when starting a lie detecting test raises the blood-pressure. But if the subject tells the truth, there's a distinct drop back to normal. If, on the other hand, he lies, the blood-pressure rises even higher than the fear or excitement level.

There's a common belief that normal blood-pressure is equal to your age plus 100. This is a rough

and ready rule which is wrong as often as it's right. Blood-pressure may vary greatly from your age plus 100 and still be quite normal.

Some people lie faster than they tell the truth. They're the ones who've always fooled judges and juries. But their blood-pressure rises even higher, when they lie, than does the blood-pressure of ordinary, slow liars.

Dr. Marston had a tough time getting the results of his lie detection tests admitted as evidence in court. His first partial success came in the legally famous Frye case. Frye, a Negro, was on trial for murder. The judge excluded the results of Dr. Marston's test from the evidence on the technical point that the test of Frye had been made in jail and not in open court. But the fact that there'd been a lie detector test which proved Frye innocent went before the jury and undoubtedly saved Frye from hanging. Soon after that, an Indiana judge allowed

tests to be made on witnesses when they were testifying. Recently a New Jersey judge asked Dr. Marston to establish a lie detector in his court as standard equipment, so to speak.

Police Endorse Lie Detector
Many banks and business houses now use the lie detector to examine employees when there are shortages. (Lloyd's, the famous London insurance agents, offer a 10% reduction on embezzlement policies to companies using the detector.) Police in more than 40 large cities use deception tests regularly. J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has just announced that lie detecting apparatus has been added to the laboratory equipment of the G-men. "The deception test is the best and kindest third degree I know," says Dr. Marston. "Its general use by the police and courts would shorten our expensive legal procedures and lessen your tax bill and mine."
