BUSINESS LOTTERIES

Throughout the United States, since competition has become so keen, due to unfavorable conditions, a large number of business firms have adopted many trade stimulating schemes which are in certain cases somewhat undignified and others are actually illegal. In practically every community we have seen the rather widespread use of business lotteries as a means of drawing more patronage. Lotteries are illegal both under state and federal laws but the enforcement has been lax in many places. Better Business Bureaus are opposed to business lotteries both because they are illegal and because we believe them to be a false business stimulant. Lotteries are a false stimulant to business because the participant is motivated primarily by the lure of a prize of greater value than the amount paid for the privilege of participation. He is not primarily interested or in need of the particular thing which he is required to purchase. Lotteries have been made illegal because of their tendency to arouse the gambling spirit. Persons believe they are going to get something for nothing. This is the evil in all such schemes regardless of how cleverly they are gotten up or how honestly they are conducted. Even when tickets are given free, and not dependent upon the purchase of merchandise, of theatre tickets or any cash consideration. Postal authorities have gone so far as to bar from the mails advertising matter announcing that a ticket would be given free to each person entering a store regardless of whether that person purchased anything or not. In one case of this kind there was a prize and a drawing and the action of the person going to the place of business to get the ticket was ruled to be a consideration.

In another case, a dry goods store placed in its show windows a box containing \$25.00. With each fifty-cent purchase a key was given the customer. The store sold its merchandise at the regular prices, without extra charge for the keys, and advertised that the person holding the key which would unlock the box would receive the \$25.00.

The court held that such transactions were in effect sales of merchandise and lottery tickets for an aggregate price and consequently a violation of the lottery law. The merchant contended there was no consideration inasmuch as the goods were sold at the regular price. The court, however, held that each customer was also buying a chance to win the \$25.00.

In a third case, the distribution by a theatre of produce contributed by merchants for advertising purposes as an additional attraction one night each week, according to numbers designated on tickets furnished with tickets of admission, may be a lottery, and it is immaterial that free tickets to the drawings are offered persons not purchasing theatre tickets. The court said: Manifestly it was the plan and purpose of the defendant to get additional money by putting on the chance drawing. The patrons knew it was Country Store Night. They paid a valuable consideration to participate. Nor was the fact that free tickets were given to outsiders material in any controlling sense. None such were given as a matter of fact and, if they were, it would not of itself have made any difference.
