Kitchen Match-Makers Devise New "Weddings" To Charm the Guest

As new as 1936 are marriages made in the kitchen! Strange as it sounds, it neither offers rebuff to tradition nor does the bridal party gather 'round the kitchen stove for the impressive ceremony—for the latest kitchen weddings are weddings of food!

And, as for tradition, just give a thought to those kitchen couples that hold all-time records for wedding bliss. You've attended their anniversaries ever since Hector was a juvenile canine. Turkey Coblitz celebrates his wedding with Cranberry Sauce every Thanksgiving. Apple pie and Cheese have had a long and harmonious twosome, and "Ham and—" and "Beacon and—" have ever been rivals for the "happiest" title.

Kitchen match-makers have been busy stirring up some new ones, and a long and happy life is predicted for these modern "ingredient couples". Headliners in recent nuptial news, the rice family leads the field for happy marriages. Rice has always been thrown and pelted at the bride, but at food weddings "rice is the bride". The rice gals are marrying into the most holy-toy food circles though the family really "arrived" through its own merits—everybody knows its energy, adaptability, snowiness, and mild manners. Living in perfect harmony with meat, vegetables, dairy products, or fruit, rice "gets along" in a culinary way with anything on the bill of fare.

You'll call for "a toast to the bride" on these:

Rice and Lobster Louisiana

1½ cups hot boiled rice
2 tbsps. butter
2/3 cup cream
¼ tsp. celery salt
2/3 cup canned lobster
1 tsp. chopped onion
½ tsp. salt
Few grains cayenne
3 tbsps. tomato sauce
Cook onion in butter 5 minutes. Add lobster, broken in pieces, rice and cream. When hot, add remaining ingredients and serve in hot serving dish. 5 servings.

Harmony Pudding

2 cups cooked rice
2 eggs beaten light
1/3 to ½ cup honey
¼ cup chopped dates
1 cup milk
Mix beaten eggs and milk. Make alternate layers of rice, dates. Drizzle honey over each of these layers. Repeat this procedure until all rice and fruit is used. Pour beaten eggs and milk over this mixture. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for forty-five minutes.

Rice Sausage Surprise

3 cups boiled rice
1 sweet pepper
1 lb. tiny sausages
1 cup milk
Butter
1 small onion
Remove the seeds from the pepper, chop and parboil. Add pepper and onion, chopped fine, to the rice. Mix thoroughly and put a layer in a buttered baking dish. Add a layer of the sausages which have been partially cooked, and cover with rice. Pour milk over it all and do

with butter. Cover and bake for ½ hour. Remove the cover and bake for another half hour, in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.). 4 servings.

Romance Parfait

Scald 3 cups rich milk and add ½ cup rice. Cook in double boiler until milk is absorbed, stirring only occasionally. Add ½ cup white corn syrup, 2 sqs. cooking chocolate (melted), ½ tsp. salt and 1 tsp. vanilla. Pour into individual glasses and chill. Serve garnished with whipped cream and grated chocolate.

Apple Salmon Salad

1½ cups salmon
2 cups apples, diced
½ cup celery, cut in strips
3 tbsps. lemon juice
½ tsp. celery salt
Dash of onion salt
½ to ¾ cup mayonnaise
Flake salmon and combine all ingredients. Chill about one hour and serve in lettuce cups. Garnish with sweet pickles. Serves 6 to 8.

Punchinello

2 cups tomatoes (cooked or canned)
1/3 cup rice (uncooked)
1 pkg. strawberry flavored gelatin
1½ tbsps. salt
1 pint warm water
2 tbsps. scraped onion
2½ tbsps. prepared horseradish
Dash of cayenne
1½ cups grated American cheese
Combine tomatoes, rice and salt in upper part of double boiler and cook 45 minutes, or until rice is tender. Cool. Dissolve gelatin in warm water, add tomato mixture, onion, horseradish and cayenne. Chill. When slightly thickened, fold in cheese. Turn into individual molds and chill until firm. Serve on luncheon plate in nest of crisp lettuce. 8 molds.

WORTHLESS NEWS CLIPPINGS BEING OFFERED OREGONIANS

The Portland Better Business Bureau reports that several so-called "home clipping bureaus" are sending postal cards to various people throughout the State, reading something like this:

"We have a clipping where you are specifically mentioned which may interest you. Please return this notice, along with stamped addressed return envelope and 85¢ cents to cover expense and clipping will be sent you promptly."

These home clipping bureaus, sending out such notices spring out periodically in various parts of the country, and almost invariably their existence is of brief duration, for the so-called service they offer is of negligible value the Bureau states. Briefly, these bureaus operate in this manner: they secure newspapers from numerous towns and cities, usually from points in other states, and clip all articles of any nature, in which a name and address appear. To these people they send a card similar to the one quoted.

Ordinarily, those responding to these cards are under the impression they will receive an article which appeared in a paper in the city in which the clipping bureau operates, but find, upon receipt of the clipping, that it is some minor

mention in their home town paper and of little interest or value. Some of these so-called clipping bureaus clip any sort of notice, legal or otherwise, in which a name and address appear. Not infrequently these operations have been fraudulent in character, with the operators making little, if any, effort to send any type of clipping in exchange for the fee.

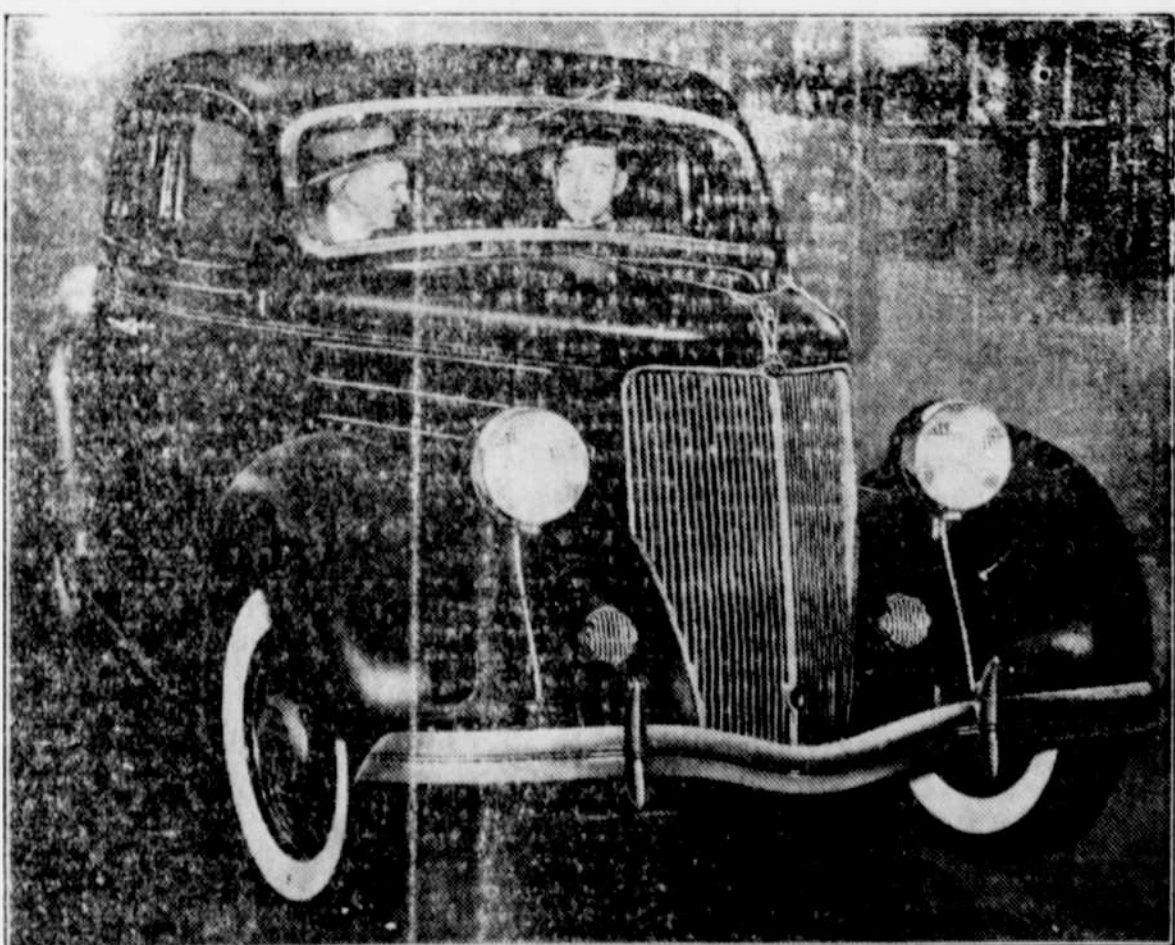
