### Modern Sugarplums

Here are some favorite fillings, each enough to stuff the standard 7½ ounce package.

**Calico Dates:** To 2 tablespoons softened butter, add 1 egg yolk and grated rind of 1 orange; stir in 1 cup confectioner's sugar. Stuff dates with the mixture, leaving some of the stuffing visible. Sprinkle surface with tiny bits of vari-colored candied fruit (you can get the candied fruits ready-sliced in handy packages)—citron, orange peel, ginger, and cherries, or use pieces of gum drops or tiny hard candies.

**Brazilia:** To 1 1/3 cups confectioner's sugar, add ¼ teaspoon vanilla, 2 tablespoons cream, and 2/3 cup chopped Brazil nuts. Stuff date, entirely closing opening.

**Mallows:** Cut ¼ lb marshmallows into quarters with wet scissors; stuff each date with a piece, leaving cut side up. Dip sticky surface of marshmallow into shredded coconut (which may be tinted green).

**French Glace Dates:** Stuff dates with a bit of nutmeat or a cube of canned pineapple, wrapping date entirely around filling. Cook a cup sugar, a cup white corn syrup and ¼ cup water to 210° F. or until syrup begins to discolor; put syrup over hot water, dip each date in syrup, let drip and cool on greased pan.

### Pep'mint Lollypops

2 cups sugar  
2/3 cup white corn syrup  
1 cup water  
Few drops of oil of peppermint coloring

Cook sugar, syrup and water, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Continue cooking without stirring to 210° F. (or hard crack when dropped in cold water). Last 20 minutes cooking should be slow to prevent discoloration. When done, remove from fire, add coloring and desired coloring, stirring only enough to mix. Pour a little of mixture on oiled platter and press wooden skewer into edge of each lollypop. 2 doz. lollypops.

### Arabian Sweets (Uncooked)

Run a package of dates, ¼ lb shredded coconut, ¼ lb dried figs, ¼ lb raisins, and ¼ cup nuts

through food chopper. Sprinkle orange rind and a little salt over mixture and knead paste to smooth ball; add peanut butter or fruit juice if necessary to moisten. Break off portions of mixture and roll in chopped nuts.

### Butter Crunch

2 cups sugar  
1½ cups thin cream  
1½ cups white corn syrup  
2 tbsps. butter  
1 tsp. vanilla  
¼ tsp. salt

Put sugar, syrup, salt, and cream into saucepan, stir over fire until sugar dissolves. Cook to 250° F. (firm ball) stage stirring often; add butter and cook to 260° F. (hard ball); add vanilla and pour in thin layer on oiled baking sheet.

### Cake Yum-Yums

(Candy and Cake Combined)

**Part I.**  
1 pkg. raisins  
1/3 cup shortening  
1 cup brown sugar  
1 tsp. cinnamon  
½ tsp. nutmeg  
½ tsp. all-spice  
½ tsp. cloves  
1 cup hot water  
Cook 5 minutes and cool.

**Part II.**  
1 cup nuts  
1 tsp. soda  
Salt  
1 cup cooked rice  
½ tsp. lemon juice  
1 tsp. baking powder  
1½ cups flour  
1 tsp. vanilla

Add above ingredients to cooled mixture (Part I) and bake in oiled pan 1½" thick (9" square pan) in very moderate oven (325° F.) for 45 minutes. Cut in squares.

### Chocolate Chews

1 cup sugar  
1 cup brown sugar  
½ cup white corn syrup  
½ cup cream  
1 cup milk  
½ cup butter  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1½ qts. chocolate

Combine all ingredients except chocolate and vanilla in saucepan. Add chocolate when mixture begins to boil. Stir over low heat to 246° F. (until a little dropped in cold water will be consistency of caramel). Remove, add vanilla, pour at once into oiled loaf pan.

## GROUP BELIEVES FERTILIZERS MISUSED

Commercial fertilizers have an important place in growing crops. Just how much money is wasted annually on commercial fertilizers, improperly used, can not be estimated. Quantities of them are bought each year and used on soil types and on particular land where increased crop returns could not be expected, in the opinion of the Washington county farmers who prepared the soils report for the recent economic conference and which was approved by the farmers present.

The use of commercial fertilizers on crops planted on land that has been cropped to grain for a good many years without the addition of applications of barnyard manure, straw or which has had a cover crop plowed under, is not likely to be a profitable practice. These farmers from their experience and observations concluded that the use of these kinds of fertilizing materials is a specific crop and individual farm problem. Any purchase of commercial fertilizer should be based on the percentage of available plant food it contains.

Growers of berries, particularly, and farmers who were also growing various other crops, discussed their experiences in making up this report and their opinions, which are borne out by other data also, indicate that where the soil is in a good physical condition due to a good supply of organic material and where the fertility is comparatively good, the use of the fertilizers will be more profitable than where the soil is in a condition opposite to that just indicated.

Ground limestone is the only form of lime this soils group cared to recommend for use in preparing land for alfalfa. At any price at which hydrated lime has been offered, the committee believes ground limestone that is available would be a cheaper acid-correcting material. Ground limestone should generally be applied on land where alfalfa is to be grown. Preferably this should be put on in the fall, but may be applied even up to shortly before the alfalfa is seeded. When it is put on in the spring, however, there will naturally not be any benefit from its action until the following year. There is not any evidence to indicate that the use of any form of lime in conjunction with the commercial fertilizer on beaverdam soil where an onion crop is to be grown, will be of any benefit. These beaverdam soils are

usually sour and to completely cure that acid condition would require a quantity of lime the cost of which would be prohibitive. Onions are not affected by a sour soil and from data available there is no indication that the use of the limestone will increase the effectiveness of other fertilizers used.

Landplaster is quite generally used on red clover and alfalfa in this county. There are some cases where it is used on vetch and peas. Its use on these two latter crops is not always a good thing, in any case where vetch either for seed or hay is pastured, an application of landplaster is almost certain to be an advantage. Where vetch and peas are planted on soils of high fertility and if growing conditions have been satisfactory, the use of landplaster is likely to be of very little importance, and in some cases its use may be a detriment, as it causes excessive growth and consequent heavy lodging, late maturity and these things usually occur at the expense of seed setting. On land that is comparatively low in fertility, the use of landplaster is of considerable value. Whether or not this is to be used on peas and vetch is a specific individual farm problem.

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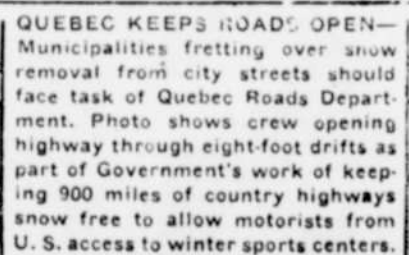

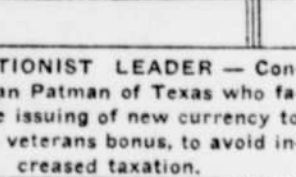

**INFLATIONIST LEADER**—Congressman Patman of Texas who favors the issuing of new currency to pay the veterans bonus, to avoid increased taxation.



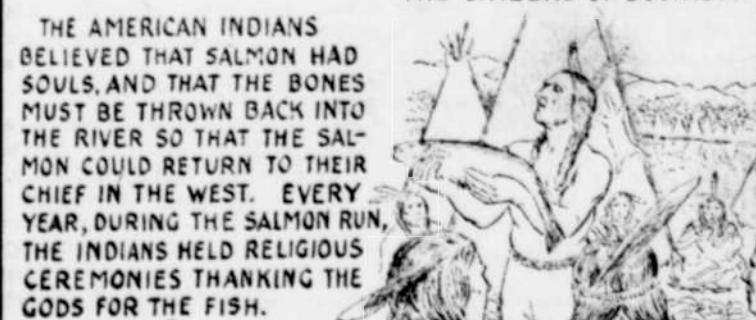

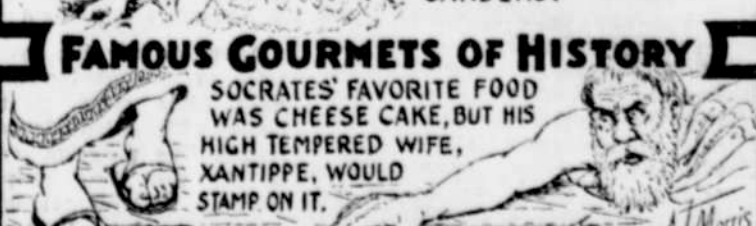
