CITY COUNCIL MEETS IN SPECIAL SESSION

Two pages to read. The letter then passed to Drorbaugh, and then the Mayor recommended reconsidering the bids. This matter had come up at the March second meeting, and referred to a meeting held February 8, when the Council met to consider the printing of the refunding bonds which an ordinance has authorized the council to issue.

This is the matter reported somewhat fully in a previous issue but not according to the minutes that were kept of the meeting. At that February meeting four so-called bids were ostensibly opened on the printing of bonds, and it was the proceedings of this meeting to which The Review took exception in our issue dated February 14.

Mr. Bump asked permission to speak and he stated that up to the time the bids were sought, and opened the proceedings were regular and legal. The Mayor, however, states that the whole meeting was illegal according to the city attorney and the proper thing to do would be to begin all over again. Thereupon Mr. Rossi moved the reconsideration of the awarding of the contract to print the bonds. This motion was, however, withdrawn, after Hulett had spoken briefly showing how the motion being made at a regular meeting might have the effect of tending

to make the proceedings at the February 8 meeting legal. After some discussion the motion was withdrawn, and other business taken up. About this time Mr. Carr came in.

Some property was discussed wherein the owner was trying to make some arrangements whereby he could clear up his title from the street improvement liens by the Council accepting a reduction in the price and the owner paying small installments on the liens.

The matter of a parking lot was discussed at some length. The lot at the corner of West St. and Broadway opposite the present stage depot was suggested by some one for a parking lot. The idea seemed to be that the Council should take a lease on the property and secure some of the Federal funds being handed out and use these funds to grade and rock the lot as parking space. The lot has recently been purchased by Albert Rossi and he offered to let the Council do what they wished with it so long as he was put to no expense. Mr. Drorbaugh suggested that with the stage depot moved to some other location the congestion would be relieved and there might be little need for additional parking space.

Mr. Barnes was called on the phone and stated that he would like to be excused. He left.

The matter of the letter from the League of Oregon cities was then considered and a letter read along with a program that is being offered at Eugene Thursday and Friday of this week. After some discussion money was appropriated
