WASHINGTON COUNTY HEALTH ASSOCIATION

"Now is the time to hold scarlet fever at the sword point," declared Miss Margaret Dixon, county health nurse, this week in summarizing the health situation in Washington county.

"Ten diagnosed cases of scarlet fever and three that are questionable, is not an epidemic in a county of 30,000 persons and is not cause for blind fear or panic but it does seem cause to raise the warning flag which says scarlet fever is bad to have and is dangerous," Miss Dixon said.

"Now is the time to calmly stop and realize the danger and map out a plan of defense. This plan, for convenience, may be divided into the following points:

"1. Remember that measles and scarlet fever can be confused. Be sure!

"2. Put every sick child away from the family, allowing only one person to attend him until it has been definitely determined what the trouble is.

Washington county has been urged to make every possible effort to increase its contributions at least 50 percent to help feed and clothe the homeless refugees, as well as to give medical and nursing care to the ill. If you have not contributed to this worthy cause, kindly do so promptly and help your suffering fellow citizens.

In Beaverton, donations may be left at the City Recorder's office.
