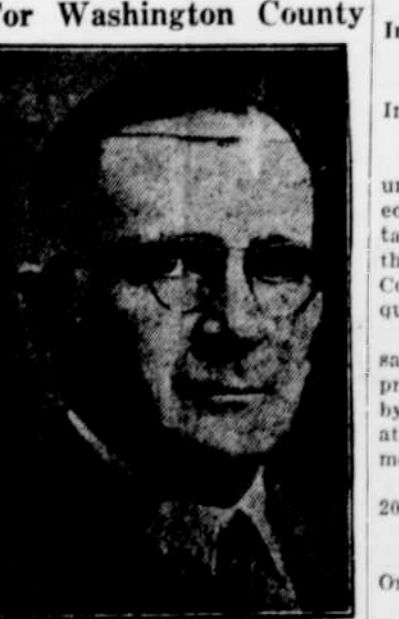

VETCH GRAZING QUESTION ANSWERED

Oregon City.—In answer to questions from many growers of hairy vetch in Clackamas county, County Agent J. J. Inskeep reports that experienced growers of the crop have found that limited grazing is ordinarily a good practice when growth is vigorous and conditions such that the plants grow to excessive length and lodge. He points out, however, that many vetch plantings have undergone heavy winter injury this year and growth is short, so that grazing under such conditions would be likely to seriously injure the crop.
