MARY RHODE STITT

At that place they were engaged in the hotel business, later moving to Beaverton where she has resided for 57 years.

To this union five children were born, four of whom, William J. and Mrs. Kate M. 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CONTROL OF WET LITTER DISCUSSED

Wet litter, which is one of the most serious problems that confronts Western Oregon poultrymen during the winter months, can be both satisfactorily and economically controlled by floor-heating, stated F. E. Price, agricultural engineer of the Oregon State college, at the monthly Washington county poultrymen's meeting, according to L. E. Francis, assistant county agent. The meeting was attended by 36 poultrymen.

Numerous attempts have been made to control wet litter by ventilation, according to Price. However, no dependable relationship has been demonstrated to exist between poultryhouse ventilation and wet litter in Oregon. Wet litter, is caused by the moisture in the air condensing on the floor, due to the fact that the temperature of the floor is lower than that of the air. The principle involved in floor-heating is to raise the floor temperature above that of the air and thereby prevent the condensation of air moisture.

Price discussed the floor-heating system used in the State College laying houses which consists of a series of eight foot chambers built between a double floor. Warm air is driven through these chambers by an electric fan. The cost of operation for a 24 by 60 foot laying house with 500 hens was approximately \$3.75 per month when operated on a half-time basis.

Other methods of floor-heating have been used very satisfactorily. One method involves the use of hot water pipes laid either in grooves in a concrete floor, or on top of the floor. Tightly boxing in the area under a poultry house and heating this entire area is another method which can be used where a house is raised a few feet above the ground. It is very necessary when the latter method is used that provision be made to allow ample circulation under the house during the summer.

For further details of floor heating as well as other features of poultry housing, poultrymen are referred to extension bulletin No. 480 entitled "Poultry Housing" which is available at the county agent's office.
