ELECTRIFICATION COURSE IS PLANNED

A course for senior 4-H club members in the principles of rural electrification has been organized by Ben Faber Portland General Electric Rural Service agent, for Washington county, and L. E. Francis, assistant county agent. The course is being given in the Chehalis Mountain district with Harry Schmeltzer acting as local leader for the group.

The work will consist of training in the fundamentals of electricity, the principal types of wiring, principles of construction, operation and care of motors, and the application of electric power on the farm, which includes studies relating to feed grinding, water heating, irrigation, lighting, brooding, etc. Should the course prove satisfactory and popular, other communities will be included. Any group desiring work along this line should contact the county agent's office.

Polk Uses More Weed Chemical

Dallas—More sodium chlorate for control of Canada thistles is being used by Polk county farmers this year than ever before, records in the office of County Agent J. R. Beck show. Twenty farmers purchased 2200 pounds of this material during March. Jack Stump, who used 1084 pounds of the material on 37 patches of thistles in 1935, reported to Mr. Beck that he thought he had killed every thistle on the 37 patches. He made two applications, one in the spring and one in the fall. He also reports that use of barnyard manure and clean cultivation have helped materially in his fight against the thistles.

OUTSTANDING COUNTY 4-H CLUB IS CHOSEN

The Chehalis Mountain potato club, John Schmeltzer, leader, has been selected as the outstanding 4-H club of the county and will compete with similarly chosen clubs for outstanding club of the state. This award was earned as a result of an outstanding year of achievement in project work, community activity, judging and demonstration work, and individual exhibits at fairs.
The group has stood at the top in all fields of 4-H club work which are, namely, demonstration judging and individual exhibits.
The demonstration team made up of James and George Allison and demonstrating "Treating of Seed Potatoes" won first place in the potato division at both the Washington county and Oregon State fairs.
The judging team made up of Helen Schmeltzer, James Allison, and Ellen Jaquith placed second at the Washington county fair and Pacific International Livestock exposition with one of the team members, Helen Schmeltzer, winning highest individual honors at the county fair.
First, second, and third places in the market potato class at the Washington county fair were won by James and George Allison and Helen Schmeltzer, respectively. Second and fifth places in the same class at the Oregon State fair were won by James Allison and Helen Schmeltzer. Third place in the Burbank market potato classes at the Pacific International was won by James Allison.
James and George Allison each won a scholarship to the 4-H summer school as a result of their demonstration work at the Oregon State fair and outstanding potato club work in the county. Elmer Atrops was elected by the club members to receive the scholarship which is furnished by the club with money raised by a 10 per cent tax on all premium money won by the members.
The club, made up of nine members and representing seven families within a radius of 4 square miles, has just completed its eleventh year of potato club work.
During this period of activity, which activity continually pointed towards the production of high quality certified Burbank seed, the club has played a major part in making Chehalis Mountain one of the leading Burbank seed producing centers. Each year several of its members are listed among the certified Burbank potato growers of the state.
Active potato growers and leaders among the farmers of the community who were previous members of this club are Harry Schmeltzer, Scott Haynes, Donald Schmeltzer, Frank Peters, Donald Eddy, John Strickler, Glen Kirkpatrick and Ervin Atrops. Several other potato growers of the community have been influenced through advice and information received through the group.
In the course of its time the club has had for leaders, Otto Brose, Charles Haynes, W. E. Peters, Mrs. H. P. Strickler, and the present leader, John Schmeltzer, all of whom are active potato growers.

Experts Analyze New Deal's Acts

Democratic N. Y. Times, in Editorial, Lauds Fact-Finding Group.

NEW YORK.—When the Republican National committee announced the formation of a staff of 50 economic experts to analyze the Roosevelt policies, the New York Times, an independent Democratic newspaper, declared in an editorial that "there was good reason for placing the assembling of facts and reasoning in the hands of other (than the New Deal) economists."

The Republican research department is headed by Dr. Olin G. Saxon, professor of business administration at Yale university. Dr. Saxon voted for Roosevelt in 1932 "to his regret," and says that many of his associates in the fact-finding work at the G. O. P. Washington headquarters have been life-long Democrats.

Step 'Entirely Logical'

The Times' editorial, entitled "Campaign Research," read in part as follows:

"That the Republican National Committee should, according to the announcement of Chairman Fletcher, have organized a committee of economists to 'analyze the New Deal,' to criticize, in the light of economic science, the principles or programs of action adopted by the present Administration, is in many respects entirely logical. The Administration's concrete policies, in the field not only of taxation and Government finance, but of currency, agriculture, labor and social problems, have been pursued under the inspiration of professional experts advocating ideas or theories of their own, often departing widely from the opinions of other experts in the same fields. When it should become the duty of the opposition party, in the course of the Presidential campaign, to criticize or attack these executive policies, or any of them, there was good reason for placing the assembling of facts and reasoning in the hands of other trained economists. A solid basis for argument would be provided by this 'Research Division' of the national committee. This should be a welcome contribution to serious discussion of such policies, instead of mere platform denunciation and recrimination."

Voting Public Is Judge.

"To what extent the work of the economic committee will contribute definitely to the formulation of public opinion on these questions and to the determination of political action is perhaps more debatable. The term 'Brain Trust,' used ever since the inauguration of 1933 to describe the experts whose judgment the Administration had adopted, has not been employed very respectfully by the community at large, and newspaper columns have at once applied to the proposed Republican commission the title of 'Republican Brain Trust.' Furthermore, the theories of the Administration Brain Trust have been more or less obscured by the concrete developments following application of their ideas in legislative or administrative practice. It will remain to be seen how far the general voting public is interested primarily in the economic facts underlying such governmental action."

Dr. Saxon, in explanation of his department, stressed the point that its purpose is "simply to assemble information which is accurate and truthful and make it available to the Republican party." Dr. Saxon said further: "We have no desire (nor would we be permitted) to impose any pet theory or hobby of our own upon the Republican party. When we have established the facts—our job is done. If this is a trust, it is a Common Sense Trust."

Emmons, Beaverton's life saver, took high honors with 17 points for Beaverton. He placed first in the 100-yard dash, tied for first in the 220 yard dash, first in the shotput, and second in the discus.

MOTORING with MILADY by JEAN MARSH

YOU know, it's a funny thing. Take a dozen persons in almost any drawing room, and they are exceedingly polite. But put those same people in a group of motor cars, start them off together, and before long they will be engaged in a vicious battle, each trying to beat the other by cutting him off, forcing him into the curb, or doing any one of a dozen different things that seem to be common practice among motorists, yet might easily result in an accident. One wonders, sometimes, whether the exercise of a little ordinary courtesy such as we display at other times would not reduce the annual toll of fatalities.

Few persons use the proper signals in driving, in fact, many fail to signal at all, probably because they feel it is too much trouble, or too chilly, to roll the window down and extend the arm. In some states, however, the authorities really enforce the regulations. In turning right, one should hold the left forearm in a vertical position. To signal for a left turn, one holds the arm out horizontally. A stop is indicated by placing the arm down at an angle of 45 degrees. Use of the fingers, in addition, sometimes is required, but the arm would be enough if every one followed the procedure outlined.

Speaking of safety, have you seen the new arrangement for a coupe that does away with the necessity for the rumble seat? Four persons may now ride inside, where they are protected from wind and weather, as well as the possibility of injury in case of accident. Two ride beside the driver. The fourth sits sideways behind them, his back resting against the left side of the car body, which is padded and upholstered. He has ample headroom and legroom, despite the fact that the exterior measurements have not been altered to any great extent. The

auxiliary seat folds into a recess in the rear wall when not in use, providing a large luggage compartment. Elimination of the rumble seat also has increased the useful space under the rear deck. (See illustration.)

Introduction of the split-back front seat in a number of coach models should be hailed with delight too. The old bucket type never was particularly comfortable, because one couldn't move around sufficiently. In addition, it is now possible for two persons to ride in front beside the driver.

I wonder whether many motorists know they can save about 30 per cent in the cost of having their cars

greased if they invest in "service books." A book providing for six complete chassis lubrications and one greasing of the front wheel bearings is being offered by the dealers handling at least two lines of cars with which I am familiar. The cost for this service normally would be something like \$6.60, but the books are sold for \$4.25. That should certainly appeal to the ladies and their husbands, too.

Have you had any trouble in shifting gears? If so, probably it is because the lubricant in the transmission and differential is too heavy, with the result that it won't allow the gears to spin freely enough. Grease, you know, has a tendency to congeal when it gets cold.
