### COSBY WARNS NOT TO CROWD PULLETS

Don't crowd the growling pullet either in the brooder or on the range, was the warning issued by H. E. Cosby, extension poultryman, at the monthly meeting held in the Beaverton high school Tuesday of last week.

Profits that the poultryman will realize from his flock of pullets will depend to a considerable extent upon the manner in which these birds are raised during the growing period, commented Cosby. Over-crowding, either in the brooder or on the range, is dangerous from the standpoint of disease concentra-

tion and also from the fact that green feed and freedom of range are limited.

Cosby further cautioned the growers against purchasing chicks from flocks which have not been tested for pulorum disease. Pulorum disease is one of the most serious menaces to brooding and one which can very readily turn a profitable brood of chicks into a total loss. With the satisfactory methods for testing the breeding flocks there is no excuse for any breeder not testing his stock and the purchaser of chicks should demand this consideration.

He further remarked that coccidiosis is a frequently discussed problem of the poultryman's, but one which is still vital to the industry. Coccidiosis is always present in a flock of chickens and, while immunization is the only final control, the serious outbreaks in a flock can be readily averted by following the long-established control practices. Cosby finally pointed out that mycosis, which is a fungous disease frequently found in turkeys, is not a problem among chickens in spite of considerable agitation which has recently been stirred up with regard to this question.

The balance of the evening was spent in discussion of individual problems.

This was the final meeting of this season's series of monthly poultry meetings. They will be resumed next fall.
