COMMITTING SUICIDE

Any one who suddenly ends his life voluntarily, by his own act, is a suicide. I believe that one who ends or shortens his existence slowly—perhaps unconsciously—commits the same unwholesome deed.

I read somewhere that civilization has added seven hundred articles of food to our overworked dietary! Think of it, in the face of the fact that the human body needs actually only a half-dozen! I feel sure that the seven hundred are only modifications, mixtures, and adulterations of the few food-units required. In place of plain bread and butter, fruits and meats, we are eating distillates, fermentations, hashes and conglomerations, sugared pyramids, and highly dynamized temptations to depraved appetites, which wreak destruction by slow but certain stages on the bodies that are, from hour to hour stuffed with them, suicide? I know of no better word to employ.

Our advertising pages, woman's magazines and newspapers are flaming with colored illustrations of saturated, striped, and colored defiers of digestion. New recipes are almost daily added, that seem irresistible—as if plain, wholesome food were not inestimably better for sound sleep and good health! Our people consume tons and tons of sugar in myriad forms each year. Commercialism knows that the easiest route to the pocket-book is by way of the appetite.

There is no argument against that for long, healthy, comfortable life. Every octogenarian, even centenarian, is a living convincing witness for plain food, temperate living, and sound sleep. Every man that dies at fifty-five of "heart failure" "cerebral hemorrhage" and "acute indigestion" is a terrible indictment of our people of today. Life is too precious to be frittered away by dissipation.

If you want a good figure, healthy muscles, sound brain, and elastic step, cling to the simple diet and steady employment.

FINE EXHIBITS FOR FAIR EXPECTED

Outstanding 4-H exhibits of livestock and crops are anticipated for this year's Washington county fair, states L. E. Francis, assistant county agent.

Breed specialists, trophies and special contests have stimulated an interest which should result in a large number of exhibits as well as exhibits of improved quality. The Washington county 4-H dairy show has been classed as one of the outstanding dairy shows of the northwest. Last year there were 79 head of dairy cattle exhibited. This year there should be an increase in the number exhibited due to the fact that rulings regarding abortion testing eliminated several club members from exhibiting last year. Jersey, Guernsey, Holstein and Brown Swiss are the breeds shown.

One of the features in the livestock department this year will be the hog show. Twelve hogs were exhibited last year, whereas, this year there will be about 30. There will be classes for the Duroc Jersey, Chester White and Poland China breeds.

Crops exhibits are always limited due to the early date of the county fair, but several club members are planting early maturing varieties of potatoes and seed corn with the intention of having well-matured exhibits by fair time. There are several active garden clubs in the county this year that will be entering exhibits.

Judging and demonstration work is under way in the various clubs. Last year Washington county club members had outstanding judging and demonstration teams. Most of the club members who participated on

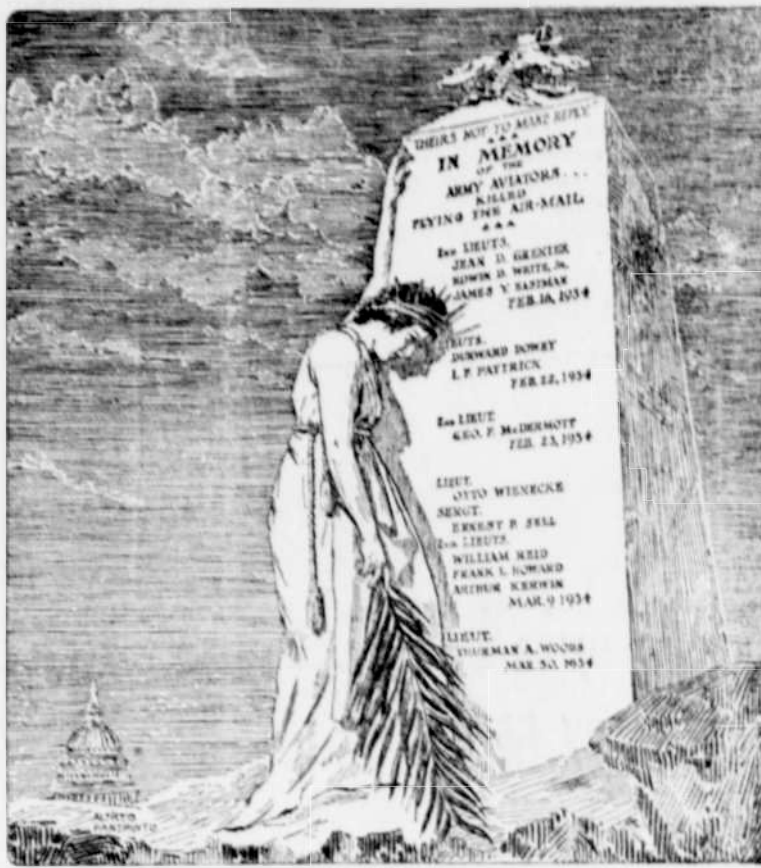
TOWNSEND MEETING

Grass Nursery Established

Oregon City—Through the cooperation of Vernon Lepler, chairman of the agricultural committee of the Mapleswood Grange, and County Agent J. J. Inskeep, a grass nursery containing 23 varieties of grasses was established on the Hepler farm late in March. The soil used for the nursery is on the border line between Amity silt loam and Willamette loam, Mr. Inskeep says. It was seeded to crimson clover in the fall of 1935, but this froze out and the soil was disked and firmed before planting the grass seed.
