Davis Shows Up New Farm Plan

Tries to Retract Views on Markets for U. S. Farm Products in Europe.

Newark, N. J.—Chester C. Davis, agricultural adjustment administrator of the New Deal, almost succeeded in covering up a statement by him which laid wide open the fallacy of the new soil erosion measure conjured up to take the place of the unconstitutional AAA. Almost—but not quite.

Davis' statement, which was issued from Berlin while he was on his six-weeks' agricultural survey of 11 European nations, claimed that there was little hope for a revived European market for American farm products. It was understood that administration forces attempted to recall it from newspapers to which it had been issued, but one, a daily in Newark, printed it and let the cat out of the bag.

For the Davis statement, it developed, was inimical to the reciprocal treaty policies of President Roosevelt and to the new erosion control program, in which much stress is placed upon the necessity of developing foreign markets for American farm products.

"All over Europe," read the suppressed statement, "there is bad news for the American farmer and exporter who hopes to regain the great market he enjoyed in this part of the world a decade ago."

"Under the rising surge of nationalism and the continued threat of war, with the possibility of food supplies choked off by blockade, the leading countries in western Europe are striving to become self-sufficient and, as far as possible, to produce their own foodstuffs . . ."

"I am concerned with what these changes mean to the American farmer. We plowed up 50,000,000 acres to grow wheat and meat for Europe from 1914 to 1919. They will not be needed to the same extent for that purpose again."

"I see no sense wasting our soil resources and great national heritage of productive and fertile soil to produce for a market which we cannot have because of circumstances far beyond our control. Nearly every country we have visited has supplemented its tariffs by import quotas on some commodities. Some nations have put in effect rigid exchange-control systems which put the government in charge of every item of foreign trade. Germany is a notable example. Some countries have invoked outright embargoes."

Tugwell's Waste Goes On and On

Spends 278 Million; Houses Far Short of Program; Payroll Huge.

Washington.—When the District of Columbia court of appeals held that the President's transfer of relief funds to Prof. Rexford Guy Tugwell's resettlement administration was unconstitutional, it did not save the hundreds of millions of dollars of the taxpayers' money which have been spent by what one congressman has called "the most extravagant, the most unjustified and the most useless" of the New Deal alphabetical bureaus. Neither did it put a stop to future spending by the RA, for the decision will be appealed to higher courts.

Between May 4 of 1935 and March 23 of this year, Tugwell has received \$278,347,171, of which \$31,950,000, or nearly one dollar in every nine, has gone for "administrative" expense. Other expenditures: sub-marginal land purchases, \$44,120,328; subsistence homesteads, \$15,275,735; rural rehabilitation and resettlement, \$124,279,946; direct relief, \$16,169,354; suburban development, \$31,000,000, and land development, \$15,000,000.

Payroll Numbers 17,055. What started out as only a handful of executives in the RA has swelled to a payroll of 17,055. The payroll for administering the various units in 27 Washington buildings alone is \$25,002,085 a year. Sixteen executives are paid \$7,000 to \$9,000 annually; 41 from \$6,000 to \$7,000, and 55 from \$5,000 to \$6,000.

Professor Tugwell determines the amount of land which the RA will purchase and the use to which it shall be put. In less than a year he has placed under option 10,020,620 acres of land and has purchased \$583,840 acres.

Houses Fail to Rise. Tugwell has spent \$278,347,171, but few houses, comparatively, have ever been completed. In most cases the lands on which they are built are too poor to raise crops profitably and few families are attracted to move in. Still fewer industries are being moved to the projects.

Where houses have been completed, walls are often cracking and roofs leaking already. Tugwell's payroll for labor alone is \$30,000 a day—enough to build ten houses a day—but less than ten houses a month are being completed.

In the South, in Minnesota and in other locations the RA has given the jobs up as hopeless and is attempting to peddle the projects to private corporations, at enormous loss to the public purse.

Good Lighting Pays Eye Health Dividends

Eye protection need never be sacrificed to the decorative scheme. The lamp shown here—one of the Better Sight type—provides plenty of well-diffused, glareless light, yet blends perfectly with the room furnishings.



FRINGED shades, bare lamp bulbs, and pools of light are as out of date as plumed hats and projecting petticoats. Modernity demands good taste in lighting, and good taste is always based on sound principles. In home lighting today, these principles involve portable lamps and lighting fixtures designed not only for decorative harmony, but for lighting results and seeing effectiveness as well.

It has been estimated that today we are using our eyes for severe visual tasks 30 per cent more than was common a generation ago. Yet in comparatively few homes does the lighting meet present-day requirements.

Lighting Neglect Harmful

It is sad but true that in many homes where much thought and money has been given to furnishings, there is often the least consideration given to lighting. Light bulbs of wrong type have been put into fixtures incorrectly designed in the first place, then placed where they do little good, if not actual harm. When the eyes are punished by poor lighting, they pass along their afflictions to the nervous and phys-

ical systems. The action of the heart, for example, is definitely slower under smaller amounts of light. The focusing muscles of the eye become three times as tired under one footcandle of light as under one hundred footcandles. (A footcandle is the amount of light a candle casts on a surface one foot away). Young eyes mistreated by insufficient or improper light become a handicap to good scholarship. Poor lighting makes for restlessness, inattention and fatigue. Actual scientific research has demonstrated this fact.

Bulbs Should Be Checked. Wouldn't it be a good idea to check the bulbs in the reading lamps you use constantly? In a single socket lamp, use a 100-watt bulb. In a double socket lamp, use two 60-watt bulbs. In a triple socket lamp, three 40-watt bulbs are recommended.

If you will refuse to read very fine print for long periods of time, if you will have your eyes examined regularly, and if you will make certain that there is abundant glareless light whenever you do close eye work, you can in some measure compensate for the burdens imposed upon our eyes by modern civilization.
