The 1936 Beaverton Junior Festival to be held Saturday, June 20th (tomorrow), and sponsored to be held Saturday, June 20th. The entire day is to be devoted to the entertainment of the children in Beaverton and surrounding communities.

The opening event on the Festival Program will be the Floral Parade, which will form on Broadway between the railroad tracks and the Ritz Theatre at 9:45 o'clock. The various entries in the parade will be judged at 10:15 and the line of march to the High School grounds will start promptly at 10:45.

A special feature of the parade is a long list of cash prizes and two beautiful loving cups. Queen Barbara and Prime Minister Douglas of the Portland Junior Rose Festival will occupy a place of honor in the procession.

Another event that is attracting wide attention is the flower show sponsored by the Beaverton Grange. This beautiful floral display will be held in the work shop of the local high school and will be open to the public at 11:00 o'clock. There will be no admission charge. All flowers to be exhibited must be at the high school by nine a.m. Containers are to be furnished by the exhibitors.

A dinner will be served by the ladies of Kiwanis at the high school cafeteria from eleven thirty until two p.m. A feature of this dinner will be a variety of hot and cold home cooked foods. The prices have been made so reasonable that a whole family can eat as cheaply as at home.

Miss Marcelle Renoux will present her dancing class in a program at one o'clock in the afternoon and again at seven thirty in the evening at the High school gymnasium. The program will include a doll dance and a ballet number by the ensemble as well as several solos. About twenty four local children are enrolled in the class.

A Junior Field Meet for boys and girls up to and including fourteen years of age will begin on the Beaverton High School athletic field at 1:30 p.m. All prizes for these events will be cash.

A long list of merchandise prizes will be given away by the local merchants at the High school gymnasium at eight o'clock in the evening. The total valuation of these prizes will be well over one hundred dollars.

As a fitting climax to the Festival of Fun for the children, the adults will celebrate at one of the biggest dances ever to be given in Beaverton. "Bud" Miller is in charge of the dance committee and the music will be furnished by Barney Barnes' Music Masters, a talented six-piece orchestra, for the jitter dance. There will be no charge for admission to the auditorium.

During a ten o'clock intermission the Grand Festival Prizes—a Crosley electric refrigerator, a six-tube Zenith automobile radio, and an electric Mixer—will be awarded. Those who are unable to get into the gymnasium will be accommodated in the high school auditorium or study hall, where a loud speaker system has been installed.

The above schedule of events is expected to attract the largest crowd of people ever to visit Beaverton and the committee in charge has worked long and earnestly to assure the complete success of the entire Festival Program.
