Payrollers Write Book; Ickes Collects Royalties

Washington.—"Back to Work," a book published about a year ago as the work of Harold L. Ickes, secretary of the interior, and upon which Ickes collects the royalties, was really written by press agents for the PWA, working on federal government time and paid with the taxpayers' money. It was revealed here.

At the suggestion of Clark Foreman, Roosevelt foundation employee who planned the book, Ickes imported a young writer, Michael Ross, from England, to write the story of "recovery" in America. He went on the PWA payroll at \$8,000 a year. Ross' efforts were then re-written by Jonathan Latimer, also on the federal payroll. Parts of the book were written by K. Sewell Wingfield, assistant director of the power division of PWA, and Michael Strauss and David Wolfson of the PWA publicity staff.

Robust Spring Zephyrs Reveal Federal Waste

Chicago, Ill.—There was something in the wind in the neighborhood about the warehouses on North Water street here, and it wasn't illas. Investigators discovered that the aroma, robust and overbearing, emanated from the Federal Surplus Commodities corporation's storage rooms where 38 carloads of onions were stored. Twenty WPA workers were loading spoiled onions, which had sprouted and rotted while waiting for the FSCC to distribute them to families on relief. Workers said the stuff was being hauled away to be dumped, but John Thompson, the foreman, denied it, explaining that it was being distributed to "people with gardens" for planting. However, when a reporter started following one of the trucks Thompson called it back. Warehouse officials refused to let anyone into the building to find out how much of the supply was spoiled.

Scores of well-known radio stars are appearing at the Great Lakes Exposition in Cleveland, opening June 27 to run 100 days. A huge "Radioland" seating 13,000 people, is being used for the stars when they make their personal appearances. Heading the list of talent for the first two weeks of the exposition are Col. Stoopnagle and Budd. For the first week, The Buccaneers, well-known CBS male octette, will be the week's musical feature, with Jerry Cooper and Connie Gates heard on June 27 and 28; Irene Beasley and Stoopnagle and Budd on July 4 and 5; Robert Simmons, NBC tenor and member of the famous Revelers' quartette, Honeyboy, Sassafras and Alice Joy, blues singer, being heard on July 7 and 8. Radio's most famous bands and stars will be heard during the continuance of the exposition.

It was Radio Theatre, first in "firsts" of the shows on the air, which brought Al Jolson and his beloved Ruby to the microphone in their first co-starring appearance in a radio drama. Their play was "Burlesque" and it suited Al and Ruby perfectly. With the whole Hollywood field wide open to Cecil B. DeMille, producer of Radio Theatre since the program moved to the coast, there seems no limit to the personalities, not generally available to radio, who can be induced to guest star in these Monday night programs.

Bob Burns, caught in a lull during rehearsal for one of the Music Hall broadcasts with Bing Crosby, told how the bawozooka was born: "One night at band practice in the plumbin' shop back in Van Buren, I picked up a piece of gas pipe. WARN VETS AGAINST BONUS RACKETS

Oregon veterans are warned to be on the look out for schemes designed to trick them out of their bonus money according to a release by the Portland Better Business Bureau.

For months, the report states, the racketeers, the slickers and the fake stock promoters have been devising ways and means of separating three and one half million people from two and a half billion dollars of adjusted service pay. Old rackets are being dusted off and new ones created by the bunco men who hope to "cash in" on this unprecedented distribution of funds.

It is pointed out that every veteran now becomes a "prospect" in the card index of the "get rich quick" promoter and every known lure of quick riches and easy money will be employed in the urgent sales efforts of these business charlatans.

Particularly the veterans are urged to be wary of the "turkey" tactics that will be used by many of these unscrupulous promoters, for in most cases questionable deals are put over by the promoter who insists that the victim act at once, thus avoiding the possibility of an investigation that will reveal the fraud or the unsound elements in the proposition.

As a safe guard against becoming involved in losses through schemes of doubtful character, it is suggested that veterans investigate unknown offerings or deals presented by strangers through the Better Business Bureau, the Chamber of Commerce in their locality or their bank and they are advised to promptly report any bonus rackets that come to their attention.
