Kitchen Flips That Never Flop

Turn Flips—Watch It Float!
Cream of Chocolate—Give Jumbo a Ride—and Hit a New High with Skyscrapers. Sound like an amusement park? It is, but it all happens right in your own kitchen, and these names are just of ice cream dishes—but what ice cream dishes!

A child's idea of paradise in the summer is no fairy castle, but a shining emporium where tall stools flank a marble slab and magic spoons, and long curly-handled spoons evolve heavenly mixtures—the soda fountain!

You can make it all come true at home, at dessert time, or when you want to tickle your party guests. Lay in a good supply of bananas. Collect a little store of nutmeats and some cherries or mint for garnish. Have some syrups on hand—one "making" will last for ages. Crank, freeze, or buy your ice cream and set out to beat that white-capped boy at his own fascinating game!

Banana Skyscraper

(A "Split" on End)
1 tbsp. syrup (chocolate, pineapple or other flavor)
1 ball vanilla ice cream
1 ripe banana (quartered)
1 ball chocolate ice cream
2 tbsp. syrup
Whipped cream
Maraschino cherry

Place the one tablespoon syrup in bottom of a tall glass dish. Put in the ball of vanilla ice cream (use "scoop" or a large tablespoon). Quarter one ripe banana by cutting once lengthwise and once crosswise. Place the quarters upright on the ice cream, with the points of the banana upward and the cut side next to the glass. Put a ball of chocolate ice cream on top of vanilla ice cream, between pieces of banana. Cover with 2 tablespoons of fruit or chocolate syrup. Top with whipped cream and garnish with a cherry.

Chocolate Dream

(Jumbo Style)
1 ball vanilla ice cream
1 ball chocolate ice cream
1 ripe banana
1 tsp. marshmallow syrup
1 thin fudge sauce
Maraschino cherry
Chopped nuts
Peel banana and slice lengthwise into halves. Place cut side up in narrow glass dish and top with the two balls of ice cream put side by side, "jumbo style". Cover vanilla ice cream with fudge sauce and chocolate ice cream with marshmallow syrup. Top with whipped cream, chopped nuts and 1/2 the maraschino cherry on each ball of ice cream.

Great Shakes!

(A "Float")
Slice or break ripe banana into bowl and heat with rotary egg beater or electric mixer until creamy. Or press banana through medium mesh wire strainer with a spoon. Add 1 cup cold milk and 1 tablespoon vanilla ice cream and mix in cocktail shaker.

Sundae Sauce

(Good Everyday)
2 eggs, chocolate
1 cup cold water
1 1/2 cups sugar

A SIMPLE job of modernizing the bathroom or kitchen can be done by covering the walls of the room with tempered pressed wood which has been scored in squares. This can be obtained at most lumber yards, where it is known as tempered tile. An advantage of material of this type is that it is not affected by moisture and can be painted, either overall or in checkered squares or any other design, to fit in with the color scheme. Standard decorative moulding serves as trim at the top and bottom and it may be fastened to the walls either by waterproof glue or with a few finishing nails. It comes in sheets as large as 4 by 12 feet.

Hints for Motorists

It is unnecessary to take the vacuum windshield wiper apart for its periodic oiling. Instead, remove the regular hose from the wiper and attach a short length of rubber tubing. Insert the free end of the tubing in a can of oil and open the shut-off valve. Move the wiper blade back and forth several times. This will suck in the oil and lubricate every part of the wiper.

Cleaning grease-spotted cement garage floors can be a difficult job, but use of a mixture of kerosene and ashes will make it an easy one. Loosen the surface dirt with a shovel or hoe. Then sprinkle a cup of kerosene on the floor and rub it into the grease spots with an old broom. Work several shovelfuls of fine furnace ashes into the kerosene and grease. After a good scrubbing and sweeping the floor will be found clean and white.

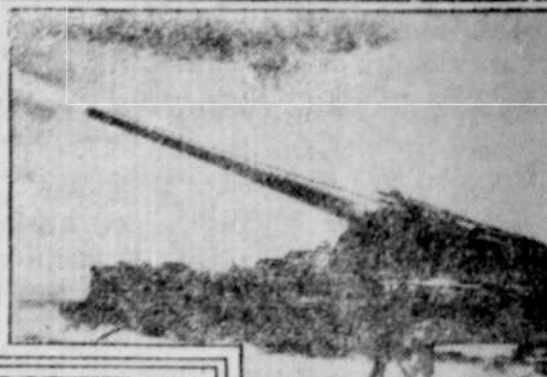

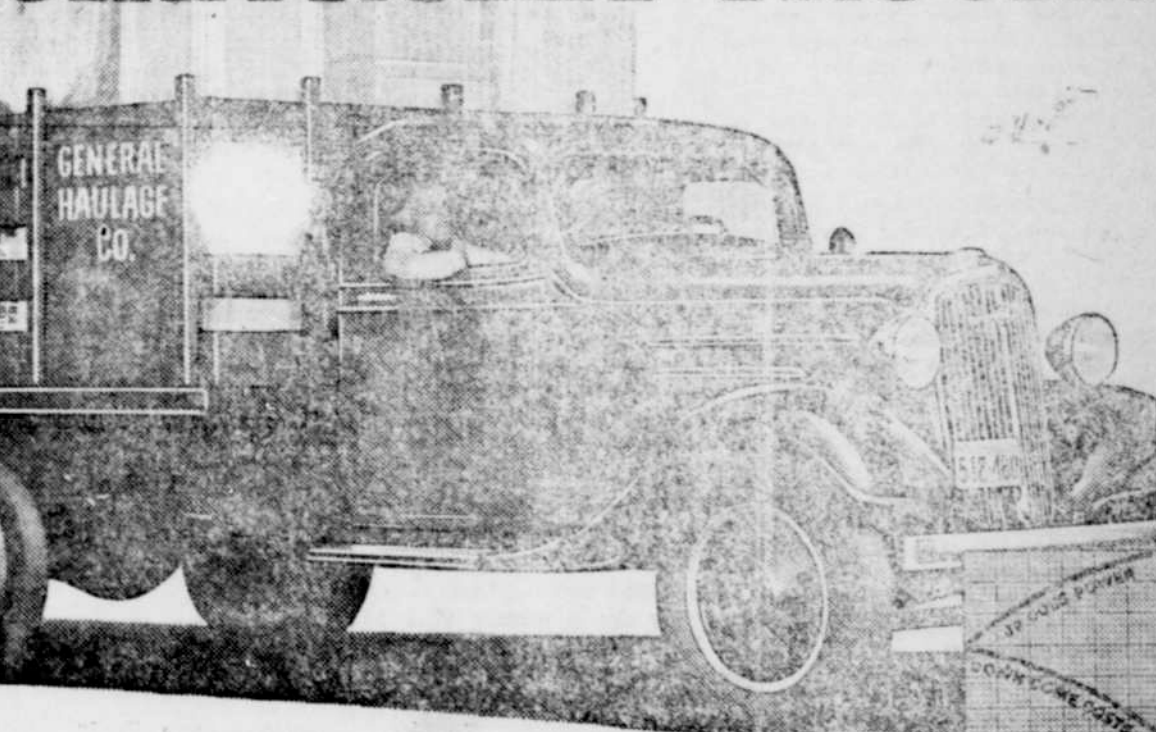

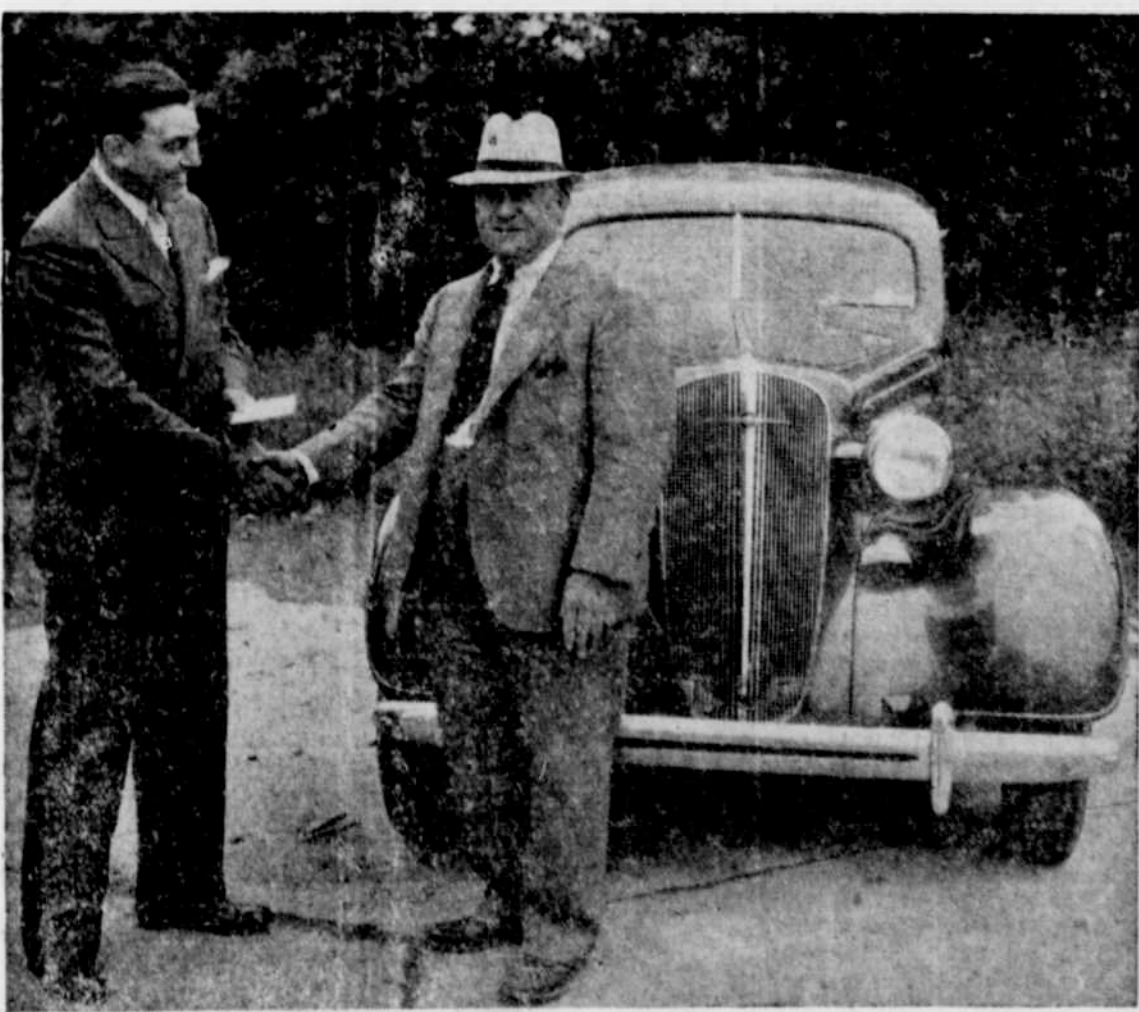
