COUNTY RED CROSS PICNIC TO BE HELD

CULLING OF HENS IS DEMONSTRATED

R. E. Cosby, extension poultryman, gave a demonstration on culling laying hens at the R. H. Kinchloe farm at Hazel Dale, reports L. E. Francis, assistant county agent. Sixty poultrymen were present at the demonstration.

Mr. Cosby culled 200 year-old hens and 100 two-year-old hens, discussing in detail the procedure for properly culling the birds and giving the poultryman an opportunity for carefully examining birds which he considered outstanding producers and others which he classed as readily determined culls.

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
