Arrested At Noonday

Paul, on the road to Damascus with a search-warrant, is to drag out and torment the Christians up there. And at noon-day as he and his horsemen made their way along, there shone around him a light from

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heaven above the brightness of the sun. And a voice—"Saul! Saul! Why do you persecute Me?" It was the Lord Jesus Christ Himself. From that time on it is—"I Paul the bondsman of Jesus Christ." So comes Paul the Apostle.

Next Paul's repulsive eye-disease; a horrible ailment, they say of it. Years later when he had been used to heal the sick and raise the dead, Paul tells how he cried to God for healing for himself. God told him to be quiet—"My grace will hold you up; my strength works out through your weakness." So the passage means. The God of all grace gave strength to go thru with the ugly thing.

Again the speech in Corinth where orations had the open door. What did Paul there?—"The Message that I proclaimed was not adorned with persuasive words of earthly wisdom but depended upon the words that the Spirit taught and mightily carried home." So by God's grace Paul stepped aside from flowing and flowery speech to give the Word free course.

And in this same first letter to the Corinthians Paul reminds them of how Christ arose from the grave to show Himself first to the other Apostles. Then last of all to him—"For I am the

least of the Apostles, that am not fit to be called an Apostle because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am and his grace that was bestowed upon me was not in vain; but I labored more abundantly than they all yet not I but the grace of God that was with me" (1 Cor. 15th chap.)

So you see Paul the enemy to Christ became an Apostle; the hateful eye-disease became a blessing; oratory ruled out and the simple Gospel put in. In all these and vastly more God chose to exhibit his grace through the Apostle. Yes—The GRACE OF

GOD—That vast ocean of wisdom, power, peace and love where dwell those who utterly yield themselves to Christ as Savior and Lord.
