## "Angel" Dishes Have Heavenly Taste!

And now come the "angels" of cookery to delight the earthly inhabitants. Watch the wings of these good little dishes swoop away meal-boredom!

The name of the charming maid who first called it "angel cake" has been long lost in history's wastebasket, but the cake it was which started the angelic procession. (Some there be who call angel food cake "sweetened air" but more there are who call it "favorite cake".)

"Angels" come onto the table more ways than in plain cake however. There are "Pink Angels," made with "Angel Torte," "Angels on Horseback" a new way. There are Angel puddings, Angel pies, and of course, those concoctions of near kin: Heavenly Hash, Ambrosia, Olympian Sandwich!

The angel dishes are dainty, delicate, frothy and light affairs—with usually a bit of fruit or "fit for the gods" is perhaps a bit trite as to adjective for these foods that are heavenly to taste and received with applause by your own family "angels". Apply your sturdier adjectives when you serve the following. And remember—they are as pretty as they are good!

### Pink Angels (With Angel Torte)

2 eggs  
1/4 cup powdered sugar  
1/4 cup cracker crumbs  
1/2 cup almonds, chopped  
1/2 pkg. dates  
1 tsp. baking powder  
Beat yolks of eggs until light, beat in sugar gradually. Pour boiling water over dates (steamed), drain and rub to a smooth paste. To eggs and sugar, add dates, cracker crumbs, almonds and baking powder. When well mixed, fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Spread mixture evenly over a shallow pan which has been lined with paper or well oiled and dusted with flour. Bake in slow oven (325 deg. F.) for 45 minutes. Cool before removing from pan. Cut in inch cubes and serve in tall stemmed glasses with strawberry ice cream. 9 to 12 servings.

### Angels on Horseback (New Way)

6 bananas, peeled  
12 strips bacon  
Cut bananas in half crosswise, roll each half of banana in strip of bacon. Secure with toothpick. Broil until bacon is crisp or bake in a very hot oven (450 deg. F.) about 15 minutes or until bananas are tender and bacon is done. Bake at least once during baking. Whole bananas may be wrapped in bacon and cooked in the same way. Serves 6.

### Heavenly Hash (Frozen Dessert)

1 cup cooked rice  
1 cup whipped cream

2 egg yolks  
2 cups milk  
1/4 cup chopped nuts  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 cup crushed pineapple  
Scald milk in upper part of double boiler. Beat egg yolks and sugar until light, pour milk over them stirring continually, return to boiler and cook over hot water until mixture thickens and coats back of spoon. Add rice and pineapple and when cold, fold in whipped cream. Turn in equal mold having tightly fitting cover, seal and pack in equal parts of ice and salt for 4 hours, or place in trays of automatic refrigerator. Unmold and serve plain or with additional crushed or sliced pineapple and garnish with nuts. 8 servings.

### Angel Pudding (Heavenly Flavor)

1 cup grapejuice  
4 tbsps. white corn syrup  
1 egg white, beaten stiff  
2 tssps. gelatin  
1/2 cup cream, whipped  
Pour 1/4 cup cold grapejuice over gelatin and let stand. Heat remaining juice with corn syrup to boiling. Dissolve softened gelatin in hot liquid. Chill. When thick but not set, beat with egg beater until thick and fluffy. Beat in egg white and continue beating until mixture is thick. Fold in cream. Mold and chill.

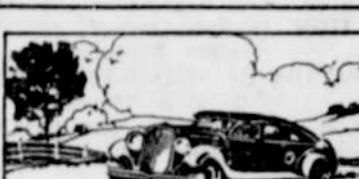
### Olympian Sandwich

(A Sweet—for the gods!)  
24 marshmallows (about 1/2 lb.)  
1/4 cup pineapple juice  
3 ripe bananas thinly sliced  
3 tbsps. crushed pineapple, drained  
1 cup cream, whipped  
Lady fingers or thin slices of sponge cake  
Heat marshmallows and pineapple juice in double boiler until marshmallows are melted. Let until cool. Add bananas mixed with pineapple. Then fold in cream which has been whipped until fluffy but not stiff. Line the bottom of automatic refrigerator tray with lady fingers or slices of sponge cake, placed close together. Cover with marshmallow mixture and freeze until firm. Serve in slices cut 1/4 inch thick. Garnish with additional whipped cream and sliced bananas, if desired. Serves 10 to 12.

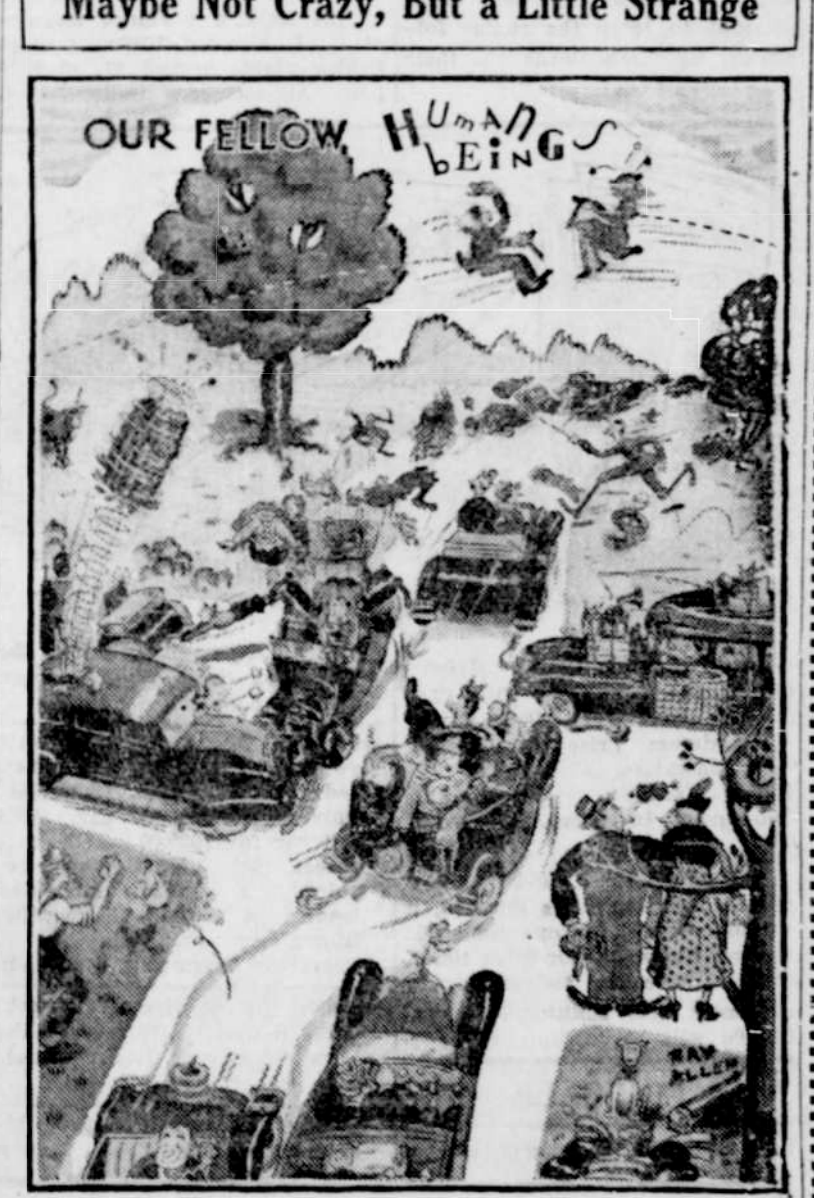

## Rubinoff Holds World Record for Broadcasting



Rubinoff and his violin—and Chevrolet—are a combination that few, if any, radio listeners in the United States have not received in their homes via the air. The famous violinist and his Stradivarius, stars of the Chevrolet Musical Moments programs, have the distinction of going on the air from more broadcasting stations than any other program in the history of radio. Three hundred and seventy-eight stations broadcast Rubinoff three times a week, a total of 11,24 fifteen-minute programs. That figures out at 233 hours, and if one week's programs were broadcast one after the other, day and night, it would require 11 days.
