SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST TO BE HELD

Livestock showmanship contests are among the interesting highlights of the 4-H program at the Washington County fair, states L. E. Francis, assistant county agent.

In this contest club members are judged solely on their ability to fit and properly show their animals. The instruction received in this phase of 4-H work as well as the interest aroused by the honor of being an outstanding showman, has developed some exceedingly fine skill in this field.

The Washington county fair sponsors a contest for each of the four breeds of dairy cattle and also for sheep and hogs. The outstanding showman in each of these groups again competes in a special contest for grand champion showman of the fair. The Sperry Flour company awards a handsome trophy or the winners in this contest.

Champion showmen of the past years were: 1933, Don Josy of the Rock Creek dairy club; 1934, John Hansen of the Rock Creek dairy club. Both of these boys were champion dairy showmen.

Last year for the first time the contest was opened for all classes of livestock, and the champion showman title was won by Clayton Nyberg of the Tualatin Dairy club. Clayton won the contest with his Duroc-Jersey gilt.

The schedule for the showmanship contests is as follows: Friday, September 4, at 3:00 p.m. sheep showmanship; 3:20 p.m., hog showmanship; Saturday, the 5th, 10:00 a.m., dairy showmanship; 1:00 p.m., champion showmanship contest.
