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## Many Features At Wash. County Fair

Large WPA Vaudeville To Be Big Event Of Entertainment

WILL GIVE PRIZES Every Other Number A Waltz Is Promised For Dance

The Washington County Fair will celebrate its tenth anniversary with an entirely new spirit and appearance, new interest, new enthusiasm, larger displays and better entertainment.

The fair opens Thursday morning, September 3, and continues until Saturday night, September 6th.

Feature entertainment will be boys and girls' get and bicycle parade Thursday night with cash prizes, under the auspices of the Business and Professional Women's Club.

At 8:30 p.m. will be the Junior Pioneer Picnic in the pavilion, under the auspices of the Hillsboro Breakfast Club, direction of Mrs. H. H. Stannard. This will be an unusual and new entertainment feature.

Friday will be Farmers' Union and Grange Day, with a big picnic in State Park. All the business concerns of Hillsboro will close from 1:30 to 3:30, and with their employees visit the fair, participating in the games and sports, under the auspices of the Hillsboro Breakfast Club.

The outstanding feature of the fair will be the big WPA free vaudeville program with 60 people taking part. The finest kind of entertainment, starting at 8:00 p.m. Friday, in the big pavilion.

Saturday will be the boys and girls' mull dog show in the afternoon, with prizes for all entrants, sponsored by the Hillsboro Rotary Club.

Saturday night, starting at 9 there will be dancing in the pavilion with Navy Bill McDonald's 9 piece orchestra and entertainers. Every other dance is promised to be a waltz, with some of the old favorite musical numbers. There will be a gift distribution at 10:00 p.m.

Many reports have been made to the Better Business Bureau by people who sent in for these genealogies, only to find, to their disappointment, that the report sent out do not go into any particular branch of the family tree, but are of a very general character.

In some instances, mailings of this outfit have carried the statement "Member National Better Business Bureau"; it is pointed out by Lyle J. Janz, manager of the Portland Better Business Bureau, that the so-called Better Business Bureau referred to has no connection with any regularly established Better Business Bureau, but is a private promotion recently subject of a post office fraud order.

## PHARMACISTS WILL MEET AT DALLAS

The American Pharmaceutical Association and its auxiliaries will meet in the South for the first time August 23 to 28.

Dallas, Texas, was chosen for the convention, members of the association explained, because the Texas Centennial Exposition is being held there, and because Walter D. Adams of Forney, near Dallas, is the only Texan ever to have been president of the association.

For the first time also, the association has been recognized by the Federal Government. Its exhibit, along with medical and dental exhibits, are displayed in the United States \$25,000,000 World's Fair under the Federal Building at the Public Health Service.

## OPEN STAGE ROUTE ON NEW ROAD TO SEA

Effective today, the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Transportation Co. open a stage line between Portland and Seaside via Beaverton, Hillsboro, Forest Grove, Vernonia, Jewell, Birkenfield, Wolf Creek road from Elsie to Necanicum junction and the Oregon Coast highway to Seaside.

The announcement of the new stage line indicates that people can now drive from here to the coast without going either thru Tillamook or Astoria, may drive the inland loop all the way to Necanicum.

On account of other carriers operating in part of the field, the new stage line will not be allowed to sell tickets for short rides anywhere between Hillsboro and Portland but the stages stop on signal and will pick up passengers over any section of their route.

## Dubin To Direct Operas In Portland

National Grand Opera Company Plans To Present Series

Laura Sharp Chilson Is In Charge Of Chorus Registrations

The National Grand Opera Company, directed by Maurice Dubin, famous Russian tenor, will present a series of grand operas at the Public Auditorium in Portland beginning with a matinee and night performance on Saturday, September 19th, of the Biblical story of "Esther" and continuing on the Saturdays of October with "Il Trovatore," "Cavalleria Rusticana," "Bohemian Girl," "Samson and Delilah," the Jewess, and "La Traviata."

These operas are sung in English and are being produced with a local chorus and professional cast of guest stars, and are designed to bring the stories and music of the well known compositions to the people who have not been able to afford them in the past. Prices are 50c and 25c for reserved seats, and a general admission in the upper balcony of 15c. Strips of six tickets may be purchased at reduced rates, which may be used as a season ticket and exchanged for a reserved seat for each performance, or may be used by a group, all on the same evening.

Mr. Dubin was a member of the late Czar's Russian Imperial opera company, and has sung with Caruso at a command performance in Royal Albert Hall, London for King George; with challenge at Queen's Hall in the Russian Opera season and with the Chicago Opera Company. For the past eight years he has directed the Northwest Civic Opera Company of Seattle. Madame Dubin, who assists her husband in the coaching of the choruses, is a mezzo, and will be heard as Delilah in the opera "Samson and Delilah."

Laura Sharp Chilson, clerk of the Auditorium, is in charge of chorus registrations and general information.

## SPECTACULAR SHOW OF CATTLE PLANNED

There will be a spectacular showing of dairy cattle at the Washington county fair, Saturday afternoon, Sept. 5 at 2:00 o'clock when approximately 90 head of 4-H cattle will be exhibited in one large group. This will be the final feature of the dairy clubs exhibit, for which the Carnation Milk Company awards a silver loving cup known as the Calf Manna trophy. At this time all the dairy animals belonging to one club are judged as a whole for the manner in which they are fitted and the showing which they make.

Thirteen dairy clubs will participate in this final showing. These clubs are: Rock Creek Dairy club, Farmington Dairy club, Hazeldale Dairy club, Reedville Dairy club, Shady Brook Dairy club, Oresco-Spokane Dairy club, Hiteon Dairy club, Tualatin Dairy club, Verboort Dairy club, Laurelvue Dairy club, Schellin Dairy club, Leisvillie Dairy club, Greenville Dairy club.

The points on which the Calf Manna awarding is based are: exhibit placings, showmanship placings, judging team placings, demonstration team placings, percentage exhibiting, and herdsman's placings.

The herdsman's score is determined by the scoring that the judges give the clubs on the appearance of their stock in their barns. This feature of the contest adds materially to the appearance of the dairy show.

The improvement in the appearance of the exhibits as a result of the interest in the calf Manna contest and also the excellent quality of dairy stock that will be exhibited by the club members this year will make the 4-H dairy show one of the outstanding interest creating divisions at the County Fair.

## MANY BIRD TYPES IN PIGEON SHOW

The extraordinary width of the National Young Bird Pigeon Show at the Texas Centennial Exposition September 4-10 was disclosed in the catalogue Walter Burton, exposition poultry director, broadcast to fanciers.

It shows competitive events for more than 380 types of pigeons representing more than 75 breeds. In addition there are approximately 500 money events.

Importance of the show is indicated by the many special prizes offered by nationally known pigeon breeders. Included in the awards is \$25, offered by the National Pigeon Association, under whose regulations the show will be held, for the best display of ten or more birds owned by an association member.

Sam M. Wise of Stamford, Connecticut, has offered \$25 on six classes of runts, including \$5 on the champion. Marion S. Church of Dallas, is offering special cash prizes on French Gros Mondaines.

The Palmetto Pigeon Plant of Sumter, S. C., is offering a trophy to the owner of the champion homing pigeon, while Harry R. Baldwin, secretary-treasurer of the National association offers special cash prizes for the first and second best display of homers.

J. J. Keifer of Louisville, Kentucky, will judge the fancy breeds; Arthur Seelbinder of Memphis, Tennessee, and Dr. Peter Treleven of Lansing, Michigan, national association president, will judge the utility breeds.

## TO EXHIBIT ELECTRIC APPLIANCES

The Extension Service's Rural Electrification exhibit at the Washington county fair will be of particular interest to the farmers of the county. The exhibit will be housed in a trailer approximately 7' by 20' in size.

On the outside, under an awning, is a cost meter exhibit which consists of an electrically lighted chart in the center of which is located a large meter dial which indicates the cost of operation of various home appliances which will be grouped around the base of the chart. Each appliance will be operated at regular intervals and at the same time the dial will indicate the cost of operation.

Inside the trailer there will be various exhibits of farm electric appliances pertaining to dairying, poultry, irrigation, water systems, etc. Accompanying these exhibits will be pictures showing how they are being put into use on various Oregon farms and also charts with data on the cost of operation.

Electric power is rapidly taking an important part in agriculture, states Francis, and this exhibit, which has been prepared by the extension service should be of considerable interest to the farmers of the county who are or may be in the near future contemplating the use of electricity in connection with their farm operations.

The latest figures from the Department of Commerce at Washington show what has happened to the American food market in two years of New Deal mismanagement. While New Deal bureaucrats were slaughtering hogs, ploughing under crops and yanking farm lands out of production, the rest of the world was busy shipping in food that the American consumer is buying. In 1933 we imported only 6,740 pounds of live-weight hogs. IN 1935, AFTER THE NEW DEAL HOG SLAUGHTER, WE IMPORTED 3,414,317 POUNDS. This is due for the foreign hograiser, but is hard on domestic producers and consumers alike. The American corn and hog producing states have been penalized by fantastic New Deal theories which have turned the home market over to foreigners. Corn, hogs and wheat represent only part of the loss to the American farmer. Hay, butter, beef and other farm products are pouring in. The American farmer is demanding that this flood be stopped.
