On Oregon Farms

Polk Hairy Vetch Yields Vary Dallas—Yields of hairy vetch seed on Polk county farms show a wide variation this year, says County Agent J. R. Beck. There are approximately 5000 acres of this crop in the county, and the reported yields have run from 60 to as high as 1000 pounds per acre. Some of the best yields have been from relatively poor crop land.

Using More Irrigated Pasture Corvallis—Benton county farmers are becoming more and more "irrigation minded," especially in the matter of pasture projects, reports County Agent W. S. Averill. Several fairly large projects are being installed this year, he says, most of which will be seeded to Ladino clover to be used primarily for dairy and sheep pasture.
