



What Is Home Without a Mother

—And a Full Cookie Jar

What this country needs is a full cookie jar! There's a platform for some candidate that will sweep him into office before you can yell "ginger snaps" and win him the vote of every child in the land. If you ask us, that famous wall motto ought to read "What is home without a mother—and a full cookie jar."

You don't have to have a jar; you can use a crock or a pan or a plate. Some modern mothers have no storage place at all, preferring to whisk up a batch often, and let the family consume them as fast as they will (lucky family!). It's not the jar, it's the cookies that count!

3 KINDS AND A COUSIN

Generally speaking there are two kinds of cookies, drop and rolled. Icebox cookies—which are mixed, chilled thoroughly and then thin-sliced and baked might be a third class if you stickle. First cousin to the cookie is the cup cake—whose mother was a cookie, whose father was a cake. Drops are most popular because they are quicker, and (scandal!) many apartment house cooks do not own a rolling pin. Choose your kind, but don't forget those thin, old-fashioned ones, in shapes like lions, and hearts and little men!

DATES MAKE DIVINE ONES

Intelligent among ideas is that of having a basic recipe which can be varied to produce all kinds to fit your mood. It is given below. For among cookies are the kind made with dates, luscious ripe dates, which are arriving right now from the Garden of Eden lands.

Date Drop Cookies

2 cups flour
2 teasp. baking powder
1/2 teasp. salt
1/2 pk. dates
1/2 cup shortening
2-3 cup sugar
1 egg
1/4 cup milk or water
1/2 teasp. vanilla

Sift flour salt and baking powder. Mix sliced dates through flour with finger tips. Cream gradually add unbeaten egg. Mix well, add milk and vanilla. Stir in dry ingredients. Drop by teaspoonfuls on well-oiled baking sheet, and bake in moderately hot oven (375° F.) until cookies are firm to the touch and delicate brown in color. 36 cookies.

Ginger Rice Cookies

1 1/4 cups flour
1/4 teasp. baking powder
1/4 teasp. salt
1/2 teasp. cinnamon
2 eggs
1 cup cooked rice
1 cup brown sugar firm packed
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup preserved ginger
chopped fine
1 tbsp. preserved ginger syrup

1/2 cup walnut meats
Sift flour, measure, and sift again with baking powder, salt, and cinnamon. Cream butter, add sugar gradually and cream well. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add rice syrup, ginger, walnuts and then flour. Mix until well blended. Drop by teaspoonfuls on lightly greased baking sheet, and bake in moderately hot oven (375° F.) for 12 to 15 minutes. 4 dozen small cookies.

New Fashioned Oatmeal Cookies

2 cups oatmeal
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 cup seedless raisins
1/2 teasp. salt
1 1/2 cups flour
1 teasp. cinnamon
1/2 cup melted butter
1/2 cup white corn syrup
2 eggs, well beaten
2 teasp. baking powder

Use ad sifted ingredients; mix melted butter, corn syrup and eggs. Combine mixtures and drop from tip of spoon onto oiled baking sheet and bake in moderate cookies.

Variation: Date Nut Cookies

Add 1/2 cup coarsely chopped nuts with dates to above recipe. Date Caramel Cookies: Substitute brown sugar for white in above recipe. Spice Cookies: Substitute 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, mace or nutmeg for vanilla.

Banana Cusins

1/2 cup shortening
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs, well beaten
2 cups flour
1/2 teasp. baking powder
1/2 teasp. soda
1/2 teasp. salt
1/4 cup sour milk
1 cup mashed banana (2 or 3)
1 teasp. vanilla
1 cup heavy cream, whipped and sweetened
2 ripe bananas sliced

Cream shortening and add sugar gradually. Stir in eggs; sift flour, baking powder, soda, and salt together. Combine sour milk and mashed bananas, and add alternately with dry ingredients. Add vanilla, and pour in greased cup cake pans or muffin tins, filling each about two-thirds full. Bake in moderately hot oven (375° F.) until cookies are firm to the touch and delicate brown in color. 36 cookies.

More Growers Brand Turkeys
Redmond—The increasing number of turkey growers in Deschutes county has made the branding of birds even more important than formerly, because there is also more likelihood of two flocks becoming mixed, says County Agent Gus Hagglund. Mr. Hagglund reports that 37 growers now have registered brands in Deschutes county.

Hybrid Corn Declared Tops

Oregon City—Hybrid corn, like the mule, may be without pride of ancestry and hope of posterity, but also like the mule, which is the best known of the animal hybrids, these hybrid corn crosses are tops for performance," says County Agent J. J. Inskeep. "Inbred hybrid crosses of sweet corn have been tried in Clackamas county for several years in comparison with well-known local varieties. Most of them show uniformity, produce high yields and have the flavor and appearance which appeals to the buyer."

Oriental Car Registers In State

Earl Snell, secretary of state, had an interesting and unusual experience this week when he registered a car with the license plates of the Chinese Republic. The owner, from Shanghai, is visiting in the state and is the first motorist from far-off China to register his car in Oregon during the last two years.

In contacting the owner, who was driving a car in the medium price range, Mr. Snell found that the license plates issued in China remain permanently in the possession of the owner, thus, the same style of plate is always used. The black and white plate consists of a many pointed star, like the emblem on the national flag of that country. The license number and some Chinese characters appear on its face.

Diesel Trucks Licensed

84 diesel-operated trucks are listed in Oregon this year, the first time that special registration has been required for such vehicles. Total fees from such registrations for the first nine months of the year reached \$16,281.95, state department records reveal.

Seed Treatment Explained

Where legume crops such as Austrian winter peas, vetches and clovers are being planted with nurse crops such as oats, wheat, barley, etc., the legume seed should not be mixed with the nurse crop seed before the nurse crop seed has been treated for smut, as the smut treatment will kill the inoculation on the legume seed, says County Agent W. C. Leth. Of course where the crops are grown as cover crops only and not to be cut for seed, smut treatment is not important. Leth points out, but even if no smut treatment is to be given, mixing the seeds before inoculation requires the use of much more inoculation material.

Know Your Language

THE combination "equally as" frequently crops up in present-day writing and conversation. It is never good English. Do not say, "Their suggestion seems equally as good as yours." Say, "Their suggestion seems as good as yours," or "Their suggestion and yours seem equally good."

Our word "supercilious," meaning haughtily contemptuous or disdainful, comes down to us from "superciliosus," a Latin word meaning, literally, "eyebrowish." The Romans recognized that raising the eyebrows was a characteristic habit of the haughty, arrogant man; so they combined their words "super" (over) and "cilium" (eyebrow) to form "supercilium," meaning "pride," and "supercilious," meaning "haughty" or "arrogant."
