

From Apprentice To President Is Career of New Rail Head

THIS announcement by the Canadian Government that S. J. Hungerford has been appointed Chairman of the Board of Directors and President of the Canadian National Railways, marks the climax of one of the most colorful careers in the history of railroading. It signifies the rise of a man from a humble blacksmith apprentice to the highest executive position in the largest railway system in America.

In between the fifty years of endeavor and achievement that have advanced him from one position of responsibility to another and have earned for him, on both sides of the international boundary, the reputation of being outstanding among practical railroaders. Although the years covered by his service have witnessed vast changes in railroading, Mr. Hungerford has kept pace with every improvement and development and the recent addition to the motive power of his company of the 6400-type locomotive, the largest streamlined engine in the world, represents, to a considerable degree, the results of his own experience and his determination to keep the Canadian National Railways in the lead among American railroads.

As Chairman and President of his company, Mr. Hungerford controls a vast network of railways, some 33,000 miles of operated track, which not only serve all of the nine provinces of Canada but also extend through the Central Vermont, Grand Trunk Western Lines and the Duluth, Winnipeg and Pacific Railways into various sections of the United States.

Mr. Hungerford was born near Bedford, Que., July 16, 1872. In May 1886, he entered railroad service as a machinist's apprentice. Successive years saw him rise up through the ranks as Master Mechanic, Locomotive Shop Foreman, Shop Superintendent and Superintendent of Rolling Stock. In 1917,

he became General Manager of Eastern Lines, Canadian Northern Railway and the following year, Assistant Vice-President of Operation, Maintenance and Construction. In 1920, when a large number of lines were consolidated into the Canadian National Railways, Mr. Hungerford was appointed to vice-presidential rank. In 1922, when the Grand Trunk Railway System was added to the Canadian National Railways, he was chosen by Sir Henry Thornton, the first Chairman and President, as Vice-President in charge of Operation, Maintenance and Construction of the whole vast system. In 1934, he was appointed President, reporting to the Trustees, a position which he has held until his present appointment.
