It is predicted that this Health unit will cost Washington County Taxpayers only \$985.00 more than the present set up for health work and the proponents of this measure who predominated

The SNAPSHOT GUILD
Christmas Photo-Greetings

Home snapshots mounted with personally lettered greetings never fail to make a hit as Christmas cards.

NOW is the time when many of you should be recalling that last year you didn't do anything about Christmas cards until just before Christmas. Then you were obliged, as usual, to buy ready-made cards when what you really wanted was something distinctly personal. And don't you remember your resolution not to let another year go by without preparing an original Christmas card of your own?

Well, here is Christmas coming on again and what have you done about it? Nothing yet? Then get busy and, since you have a camera, do you need to be reminded that the most distinctly individual and acceptable Christmas card that can be devised is one that bears a snapshot of yourself, or members of your family or your home. Such a greeting touches the heartstrings of your friends and relatives as words alone never can.

So, look over your old snapshots and see if you have one that you think suitable to go on a Christmas card. If you have none that you quite like for this purpose, get out your camera and har the picture you need to fill the bill.

The most strictly individual snapshot Christmas card is one which you prepare entirely yourself. If you like simplicity, buy plain note-size cards and envelopes, paste the prints on the cards and write on them the greeting that pleases you. Or, if you prefer, you can have your photo finisher do the work for you. Most

photo finishers supply cards for this purpose with space for the print and decorated with a Christmas motif to suit various tastes.

Ideas for snapshot greeting cards are innumerable. While your friends always will like the simple portrait, snapshot, the story-telling picture pleases most—the picture which shows the subject doing something characteristic or amusing. One of the cleverest Christmas snapshot greetings we have ever seen was that of a musically inclined family of five. It represented a bar of music, with the notes consisting of a snapshot portrait of each member of the family, each face in profile, the mouth open and head uplifted as if singing.

The card reproduced above offers another suggestion not difficult to execute. You simply letter your greeting on a piece of paper, leaving space for a name, paste the paper on the selected print and have your photo finisher make a copy negative of it. From this copy negative have him make as many prints as you need. Then in the space left for it, you letter "Aunt Mary" or whatever the name of the person to whom you wish to send the card.

But think up your own ideas—test your originality. There is a lot of satisfaction in being told by your friends that yours was "the most original Christmas greeting I have ever received—and that snapshot is you all over."

At this meeting believe that health conditions will be greatly improved. There is no question that the measure was voted with good intentions and with the hope of bettering health conditions in Washington County. However, there is some misunderstanding of the measure and a feeling that there has been some oversight in the consideration of all questions involved.

As to the cost of the health unit it is listed as follows:

1 County Health Officer's Salary	\$3,000.00
1 County Health Officer's travel	600.00
Office expense	400.00
Supplies for work	750.00
Fixtures and Equipment	1,200.00
Telephone	100.00
2 county nurses' salary	3,000.00
2 county nurses' travel	1,000.00
Clerk for office	720.00
Total	\$10,770.00

It is proposed that when the above program goes into action, the old health program is eliminated, the cost of which was as follows:

1 County physician	\$1,200.00
1 County health officer	720.00
1 County nurse and travel expense	2,100.00
Doctor's fees for county jail	200.00
Doctor's fees for insane and feeble-minded	250.00
Doctor coroner's fees	100.00
Total	\$4,875.00

There is the difference of \$10,770.00 Less \$4,875.00 \$5,895.00

It is proposed to take care of this difference in the following way:

From the Public Health Service	\$1,110.00
Federal Tax	100.00
Forest Grove School District	100.00
Beaverton School District	100.00
Tiered School District	100.00
Forest Grove Union School District	100.00
City of Hillsboro	200.00
Washington County Health Association	200.00
Total	\$4,910.00
This then leaves a balance of	\$5,895.00 less \$4,910.00 or \$985.00.

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And in the budget it was stated that it would cost Taxpayers only \$985.00 more than the present set up.

Now in analyzing the figures, we observe that \$4,110.00 from the Public Health Service has Federal Taxes as its source. Now if we can bring ourselves to realize that when every county in Every State of our Union is asking gifts totaling at least \$4,110.00 and in reality much more than this, does it not after all mean that this will become a tax on each individual county and we are only fooling ourselves when we say that such Federal tax does not mean a local tax.

But if we forget the Public Health Item of \$4,110.00, we do have listed as a source of funds from School Districts as listed above and from the City of Hillsboro a total amount of \$5,000.00. Now this sum can come out of the Taxpayer for what other source of money has a School District or a municipality?

The Taxpayer? The Washington County Health Association as a source is also not exactly a gift from private individuals, but comes more nearly conforming to the statement that

aggregated 380,000, which exceeds by 55 per cent the record of those killed in action, or who died of wounds in all the wars in which this country participated.

There is no excuse for sympathy with our common national enemy, carelessness, which kills and maims more of our people than War. (From 1922 through 1935, deaths from automobile accidents have, according to the Travelers Insurance Company,

thirty-three thousand pedestrians were injured last year doing just what you are about to do—stepping out from between parked cars. More than 1,100 were killed that way. These figures are taken from Travelers Insurance Company records.

a tax is not involved. Therefore, it would seem that a fair estimate would be that the cost of the Unit must be \$985.00 plus \$600.00 or \$1585.00, and is reality it should be listed as more than this.

It was stated before that there is a misunderstanding of all sides of the question involved. Before the budget Committee the discussion was more particularly in the interest of School Health work. One speaker maintained that Washington County really did more for cattle than for our children. She did not realize, however, that the reason we do so much for cattle is that we may have a better milk supply for our children. The welfare of our school children must be protected. No one wishes it otherwise, but with the present health program, this one County Health Officer is to do the work formerly done by the County Physician and County Health Officer.

It is not known by very many taxpayers that the County Physician has charge of the patients in Washington County Hospital and that this is quite a job in

itself. Washington County Hospital is not only used as an old folks' home, but it is developing more and more into a hospital for the dependent and unfortunate people of Washington County who cannot afford ordinary hospital and physician fees.

For example, during the month of November 1936, there were 8 cases of child birth at the hospital, and always there are a number of operations for such cases as appendectomies. There were 2 Caesarian operations this past year, and other abdominal operations classed as major surgery. There are numerous fractures of arms, legs and hips, requiring time and skill to care for, besides many minor operations, like tonsillectomies. All this work is necessary and must be considered in any health program for Washington County.

Dr. Via, our present county physician, has always furnished an assistant and has often called in other physicians of the county to help out in difficult cases. The services he has rendered has amounted to much more than the pay received. Major operations re-

quire skill and practical experience.

In the consideration of the New Health Unit one would naturally conclude that for \$250.00 monthly, applicants will more than likely be from the group of recent college graduates. Such a physician can well carry on a School Health program which, including vaccinations, the giving of Tuberculin tests, etc., is not difficult, but to shoulder upon a recent graduate the responsibility of a number of major operations is hardly fair to him now is it fair to the people who must be operated upon. This is a plain statement of fact and is not intended as criticism of anyone.

So this article concludes with the statement that the Health Unit as voted has overlooked very important matters and eventually is going to cost taxpayers much more than has been stated. One physician cannot handle the work effectively and local physicians must be called into service as heretofore. A better and more practical solution can be found.
