This interesting disclosure appears in a study made of American millionaires by the Russian economist, Pitirim Sorokin and reported in a recent number of "Social Forces".

The records show, according to this study, that of American millionaires who were born poor there were but 2.2 per cent who had made their fortunes prior to the time they were thirty years old.

Between the ages of 31 and 40, however, there is a surprising jump. Something more than 23 per cent forced to the front during these years.

It is at the age of 41 to 50, though, that the greatest gain in wealth is shown. During this period the figure rises to the surprising level of 38.7.

And even beyond the age of 51 more men acquire wealth than at 31 or below. The figure is 24 per cent to be exact. And at 61 and beyond, 11.7.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD
MORE ABOUT CHRISTMAS

Father will keep this picture, you bet.

LAST week we more or less just gossiped about the many picture taking possibilities around the home at Christmas time. This week actual examples should be in order.

Suppose, for instance, that you want to take a picture of father as he makes a valiant attempt to erect Junior's mechanical set as shown in the picture above. A picture of this type is easy to make and tells a never-to-be-forgotten story.

You can make either a snapshot or a short time exposure. If you prefer making a snapshot you will have to use a camera with an f.6.3 or faster lens. Load it with supersensitive panchromatic film which is much faster under artificial light than ordinary film. Place lamps with shades tilted so as to throw the light directly on your subject as shown in the diagram above. If lamps are of a type on which shades cannot be tilted remove shades and have someone hold a white card back of the light bulbs to throw all the light forward. In the lamp to the right replace the home type electric bulb with one flood bulb. Place two flood bulbs in the lamp to the left.

Set the lens diaphragm at f.6.3 and shutter speed at 1/25 second and stand six feet from your subject.

When using flash bulbs place your camera on something solid and set it as for a time exposure. Place a floor or table lamp at your side and within reaching distance from your camera. If the shade cannot be tilted to direct the light on your subject remove it. With the flash bulb screwed into the lamp socket you are ready for action.

Total darkness is not necessary but be sure that there are no bright lights near your subject. After making sure that your camera is set for "time," open the shutter, quickly turn on the current to the flash bulb and immediately after the flash close the shutter.

Plan now to make this Christmas a snapshot holiday and add year 'round interest to your snapshot album.

FOREST FACTS

Oregon shipped approximately 1,700,000,000 board feet of lumber by rail in 1935. This means some 68,000 carloads of lumber, a rather impressive train about 650 miles long.

Approximately 300,000 people in Oregon depend directly or indirectly on the timber industry for a livelihood. This is a population roughly equal to that of the city of Portland.

Second largest annual tree planting program in the history of the national forests of Oregon and Washington was completed in 1936, according to records of the U. S. Forest Service. More than 3 million trees were planted on 4,418 acres.

In 1935, six hundred ninety-two bull elk were killed in Oregon by 2,761 hunters and in 1934 some 3140 hunters bagged 703 elk. The elk range on the national

forests is being managed so that the number killed will not exceed the natural increase of the herds.

The tourist crop brought more than \$30,000,000 into Oregon in 1936, it is estimated. These tourists came largely to enjoy forest and mountain scenery with fishing and wild life resources adding to the attraction.

Winter sports activity on the national forests increases business activity in the towns and points the way to new exploitation of Pacific Northwest attractions during ordinarily dull winter months.

In 1936 the number of trips made by summer home users, hotel and resort guests, picnickers and campers to the national forests of Oregon and Washington totaled 1,555,000. This was nearly double the number of national forest users in 1923. Better roads and forest camp improvements had much to do with this increase.
